Epitome of Telegraphic News.

DATES TO MAY 31.

Chicago, June 1.—The Fenians invaded Canada last night, crossing Niagara river four miles below Buffalo, about 1,500 strong, and were to-day intrinsically themselves to resist attack. They are commanded by Col. H. R. Stagg and Col. O'Neill, the latter from Nashville, Tennessee. The troops comprise volunteers from the West and Northwest, and the crossing was effected by steam tugs and canal boats. Great excitement prevails in Buffalo and Canada West, and reports indicate a movement by the Fenians from Rochester, Buffalo and other land points on a large scale to join forces in Canada. Reports also indicate large bodies of Fenians at St. Albans, and points along the St. Lawrence river, threatening a similar invasion, and reinforcements are moving from Boston, New York and the Eastern States to assist Gen. Sweeney. This Fenian army of invasion is under the auspices of Roberts and in defiance of the organizer, Stephens, whose counsels they reject.

Dispatches from Toronto represent active military preparations to punish the invaders. The Canadian Government has taken possession of the railroads and telegraph, and having a large force of well organized militia at command besides regular troops, will make short work of this invasion. The U. S. troops East and West are being sent to the border in detachments sufficient it is hoped to prevent another breach of neutrality.

LETTER FROM AUBURN.

AUBURN, June 1st, 1866.

EDITOR MOUNTAINEER: The peculiar quiet of the little village of Auburn was but slightly disturbed by the session of court just held. The docket, comprising nine civil and thirty criminal causes, furnished but three jury cases, and the court adjourned Thursday morning. The rains have been very severe and the roads are in horrid plight. The Governor spoke here last Saturday, and the last heard from them was that Kelly had been entirely too much in weight for his horse and that his honor had broken down the animal on the mountains this side of Granite Creek. Baker county will give a Union majority.

The Indians on the Owyhee, ten days since, killed twenty-seven Chinamen and two Americans, and a day or two afterwards, killed two citizens and six soldiers at Owyhee Ferry—both transactions being on the Hallock Chico route. The news came by letter yesterday and is reliable. Yours, etc., VIATOR.

It is most gratifying to know that notwithstanding the long continued domination exercised in this Territory by certain parties over the masses of the people, they are not able to seduce into disloyal practices all those who may be willing to follow their dictation in pure doctrinal matters. We are rapidly gathering here a population which entirely ignores dictation from self-assumed leaders in any matter, whether political or religious. This class now number enough to hold in check for the present any attempt of these self-assumed leaders to carry out their heretofore successful policy. These leaders have been taught that all American citizens have right in Utah—whether they be Mormon or anti-Mormon.—Vedette.

Ordinance No. 39.

AN ORDINANCE to License Hotel and steamboat Runners.

The people of Dalles City do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Any person who shall solicit patronage for a Hotel or Steamboat, commonly called a "Runner," within the corporate limits of Dalles City, shall therefor procure a License from the Recorder, and shall pay therefor into the city treasury the sum of Ten Dollars for every three months.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall do business as a runner, who by malicious misrepresentation shall injure, or attempt to injure any Hotel, Restaurant, or steamboat, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding twenty dollars for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall do business as a runner without procuring a license therefor, shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine in the sum of twenty dollars.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 21 day of June, 1866. Passed May 16th, 1866. G. D. GILMAN, H. CATLEY, Recorder. my29-15t
