WILL SELL \$100,000.00 WORTH OF OLD BOOKS

Volumes From Huntington Library are Being Eagerly Sought By Collectors.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—The late Collis P. Huntington's nephew, Henry E. Huntington, who married his uncle's widow and who has spent three of the 60 million dollars the railroad baron left him, for rare books, will sell \$100,000 worth of duplicate volumes at auction at the Anderson galleries here, today and tomorrow.

Huntington possesses probably the most remarkable and valuable library in the country and one of the finest in the world. It is believed that before he has done, his collections will be unrivalled by that of any collector, past or present.

Huntington bought a million dollars' worth of books from the Hoe collection alone. He paid half a million cash for the Duke of Devonshire's library and has bought a dozen other world famous collections from which he has skimmed the cream and disposed of the balance. He employs a small army of cataloguers and assistants and spends a fortune annually for the care of his books.

It is believed that Huntington intends to center his main collection at his home in Los Angeles.

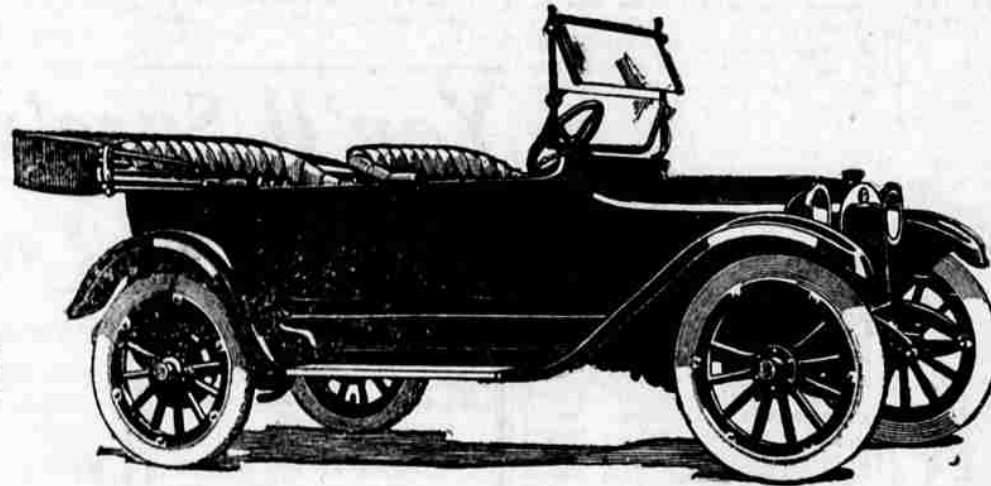

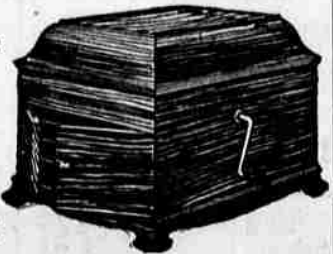
