NEW YORK, March 9.—Peter Gullatto, otherwise known as Pete Herman, the new bantamweight champion, is off to a running start in the defense of his acquired title. He is one of the boys to whom the newspaper writers point with pride as a youth who isn't assuming, wants to fight, and is otherwise an ideal chap. Whether he'll be able to live a life of fame without getting the swelled head and a consequent reputation for using dollars as a bed is something to be developed in the spring of old man Time. Right now he has it. It is to be hoped he sticks by it. Pete began this life as a bootblack. Being a native of Italy, he has nothing on several thousand of his countrymen who are shining their way to fame in the lanc of the free and the home of the brave.

There was a bad, though bold character in New Orleans, where Pete gathered in the nickels, who used to come around once a week and make a collection of nickels and dimes off the bootblacks. They all paid up like little men—Pete included.

One day Pete decided he wanted all the money he made for his own, and he laid for the youth who came around for the dimes. He refused to shell out, with the result that the youth caught Pete on the chin and nearly pulverized him. When Pete came to, he brushed his clothes, started down the street, and when he found said youth he commenced to fight. The youth of the dime and nickel collection was sent to a hospital. From that time on Pete had his nickels and dimes and a fighting reputation. The latter was so good that he decided to put it to use, which he did with such success that he has towered over the others in his class to the extent that he now is champion.
