At the Movies

Bend Theatre
Tomorrow and Wednesday evening the Bend Theatre will present Fannie Ward, one of the stars of the Paramount Pictures, in the Columbia University-Lasky prize photoplay, "Witchcraft."
The story tells of a little New England maid, who lived in a stern superstitious Puritan colony. The time of the action is about 1690



when persons were persecuted on the charge of being witches. Circumstances brought this charge to little Suzette. The photoplay tells of her miraculous escape from the death penalty, while the theme contains also a love story of intense interest.
It will be remembered that Fannie Ward scored a great hit at the Bend Theatre last fall in her appearance in "The Cheat."
This evening Bessie Barriscale will again appear in "Honor's Altar," a domestic problem play.

Grand Theatre.
Eugene Moore, who directed Jeanne Eagels in "The World and the Woman," a Pathe Gold Rooster play, produced by Thanhouser, and to be shown at the Grand Theatre on Tuesday, studied to be a minister at the divinity school at Harvard, but gave up that career to become an actor.
Mr. Moore was born in Annapolis Valley, Nova Scotia, the land of Evangeline, but lived most of his early life in Boston.
Greatly interested in Shakespeare, Mr. Moore decided to try big things at the start, and his first application for a position on the stage was made to Thomas W. Keene. He was given a small part and quickly made a reputation as a Shakespearean actor, appearing with John McCullough, Frederick Warde, Louis James and Stuart Robson.
He left the classical drama and was starred for five years in Augustus Thomas' "The Burglar." He then joined the Frohman "Diplomacy" company. After several seasons in stock, Edwin Thanhouser sent for Mr. Moore, when the Thanhouser Film corporation was just getting under way, and made him director. Mr. Moore has directed some of the best productions that the Thanhouser company has released.
