OHIO CAN FURNISH 500,000 SOLDIERS

(By United Press to the Bend Bulletin)
COLUMBUS, O., April 21.—Ohio is taking stock, preparing to "do her bit" in the war. Various state departments reported today, showing her man and munition power as follows: Five hundred thousand men of military age, 20,000,000 acres of farm lands, nearly \$2,000,000,000 resources, 1600 plants capable of making war munitions, 340,000 autos in the state, and a coal producing capacity of fifty million tons.
