NATIONAL LABOR BOARD

by the President, by and with the consent of the Senate.

The measure gives drastic power to interfere in labor wars, but will not attempt to prevent labor of its prerogative to cease work individually or collectively, or to prevent employers discharging men.

By preventing the possibilities for decrease in wages, or of other laboring conditions, it is thought that the cause for strikes would be removed. The proposals made by the bill are similar to recommendations made by the President in February.
