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ALLIES RESUME HEAVY ATTACK

MOUNT CORILLET IS FRENCH REWARD.

German Drive for Petrograd Is Re-
vealed by Prisoners — Italians
Scale Dizzy Heights in the
Austrian Campaign.

LONDON, May 21.—British and French forces started another joint offensive move today, General Haig capturing several sections of the von Hindenburg line. General Nivelle took several lines of the German trenches, achieving a brilliant success on the north slopes of Mount Corillet. The resumption of allied activity follows a week's lull.

Von Hindenburg is hurrying his shattered and exhausted divisions from the west front to the northern and eastern battle fronts, where preparations are beginning for a drive toward Petrograd. Fresh divisions from the Russian front are being sent to France.

German prisoners divulged the purpose of the new German plan. "We expect von Hindenburg will try to take Petrograd," said one, "in order first, to scare Russia into a separate peace, and secondly in order that gains in Russia may be used as a lever against the Allies."

British headquarters estimated that 20 German divisions have been demolished since the beginning of the present campaign.

GERMANS ADMIT LOSS

BERLIN, May 21.—The French have succeeded in getting a hold on Mount Corillet, while the British occupied a "completely demolished trench, abandoned in accordance with out plans," it was officially stated today.

SINGING WARRIORS WIN.

ROME, May 21.—Climbing seemingly inaccessible heights, and singing as they go, the Italians are pushing forward north of Gorizia. Fighting has reached the climax of intensity. Numerous fresh Austrian divisions, direct from the Russian front are engaged.

Austria has started a counter-offensive in the Trentino section, designed to relieve the increasing Italian pressure elsewhere. The enemy's attacks at Trentino are greatly increased, but attacks are being steadily repulsed, and the Italians are gaining ground.

SERMON GIVEN BEND SENIORS

REV. W. C. STEWART, IN BAC-
CALAUREATE ADDRESS, URGES
HIGH IDEALS — PATIOTIC
YOUTH OF CITY PRAISED.

Urging the mapping of a life plan in youth while ideals are highest, Rev. W. C. Stewart, pastor of the Methodist church, delivered the baccalaureate sermon to the members of the high school graduating class last night at the high school auditorium in the presence of a large audience of parents and patrons of the institution.

Speaking from the text, "What Is Your Life?" Rev. Stewart emphasized that the possibilities for great good or great evil are present in every individual, and advised that the Bible be the key with the aid of which life is to be interpreted.

The acquisition of power he mentioned as one of the things most frequently sought, but pleaded that it be power of the right kind. "Czar Nicholas is drinking the bitter draught of power now," he declared, "and it will not be long before Kaiser Wilhelm is doing likewise." In this connection, he predicted the early transition of the kingdoms and empires of the old world into republics, and praised the spirit of service which has sent so many Bend boys to the army and navy in the time of their country's need.

Principal Eric Bolt introduced the speaker, following a duet by Mrs. F. Thordarson and Roy Gilson. Rev. J. L. Perlinger, of the Baptist church, opened the service with prayer, and Rev. H. C. Hartman, of the Presbyterian church, delivered the benediction.

WORDY GAME IS TAKEN BY BEND

SEASON'S BEST CROWD SEES CONTEST.

Four Runs for Home Team Eat Up
Long Lead in Last of Tenth, and
Take Game by 11-10 Score
—Tetherow Hit Hard.

Bend and Prineville debaters, 18 of them, met in wordy combat here yesterday. In the intervals, they staged a ball game which went 10 innings and resulted in an 11-10 victory for the locals. Frank Shugert was more or less satisfactory as chief arbiter of many disputes, and the generosity displayed by the Prineville slabster, Tetherow, in allowing an even score of hits, was a noteworthy feature of the conflict. The crowd was the best of the season.

The two opening frames were blanks, but in the third, the visitors drew first blood when Merchant went first on pitcher's error, stole, and scored on Bowman's hit, which incidentally advanced Albee who had walked, to third. Stapleton took first on Davis' error, and Albee scored. In the fourth, Ellis walked, advanced on Kaufman's sacrifice, scoring on Merchant's hit. Merchant scored on Tetherow's single, and a neat double play, Stover to Davis, cut off Tetherow and Albee.

Bend came back strong in the last of the fourth, O'Donnell tripling, scoring on Clow's three-ply swat. Steele dropped Lynch's long fly to center field and Clow scored.

In the first of the sixth, Ellis added another for Prineville, while Lynch for Bend, went first on Davis' out, took second and third on errors by Erickson and Albee, and scored on Hollinshead's hit.

Locals Take Lead.

Bowman, Prineville right fielder, started the round trip in the seventh, on Davis' error, and scored on Erickson's two-bagger. It was then that Bend started the massacre, batting all the way round, and plucking off four tallies. Merrill tripled and scored on Johnson's single. Johnson advanced on O'Donnell's single, and Davis' single aided by Merchant juggling the horsehide in left field, scored Johnson and O'Donnell, and enabled Davis to reach third, while a minute later he trotted over the plate on Lynch's safe one. Merrill relieved Springer on the mound at the beginning of the eighth.

Erickson tied up the game in the ninth, lacing out a two-bagger, going to third on Stapleton's hit, and scoring on Johnson's throw to second. In the tenth, with two down, the visitors amassed a seemingly safe lead of three. Albee walked, Bowman reached first on Clow's error, and Bowman scored on Erickson's single. Bowman took third as Albee went home, scoring on Stover's error. While Steele was fanning, Erickson came in on a passed ball which was stopped by the crowd.

Four Runs Win Game.

Springer inspired the melee in the final half, striking one out for two bases. Hollinshead fanned and Stover singled. While the guardians of the first and second sacks were endeavoring to run down the Bend second baseman, Springer scored. Merrill recorded Stover's tally with a three-bagger, but was caught at home on Albee's assist. Johnson gaining plate. O'Donnell singled and crossed the plate just behind Johnson, on Clow's three-bagger, winning the game.

WOMEN OF U. S. KILLED IN WAR

NURSES ARE HIT BY PIECES OF SHELL.

Mrs. Edith Ayers and Helen Woods
First Victims—Tragedy on Mon-
golia Prompts Government
Manitons Probe.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—Mrs. Edith Ayers and Helen Burnett Woods were killed when a portion of a bursting shell struck them, while they were aboard the steamer Mongolia watching gun crew practice, according to official advices.

These two are America's first women victims of the war, another nurse being merely wounded. All three were members of a medical unit organized in Chicago, and both of the women killed were residents of that city.

In some inexplicable manner, the shell exploded, and fragments of the casing were thrown into a crowd of doctors and nurses who stood watching the American navy gun crew at work. A life boat was between the women and the gun. Both Mrs. Ayers and Miss Woods were experienced Red Cross nurses.

A United States revenue cutter met the Mongolia, and bore the dead to port. The Mongolia turned back, and is reaching American shores today.

Inquiries concerning the condition of ammunition on board the Mongolia developed the fact that the government is investigating whether or not faulty shells are on the St. Louis. German tampering with munitions is suspected.

MEXICANS FIRE ON AMERICAN SOLDIERS

Shots Directed at Snipers in Houses
Just Across Line Quickly Bring
Trouble to An End.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—A clash between the United States troops and Mexicans was officially reported to the State Department today.

The message stated that a group of filibusters crossed to the American side near Nogales, and were captured by American troops and customs officers. George Holmes, believed to be an American, and Manuel Gonzales are among the prisoners.

Another message described firing from houses on the Mexican side of the line. When the American soldiers, against whom the fire was directed, returned the shots, trouble ceased.

OREGON SENATOR IS NOT OUT OF DANGER

350 NEW LAWS GO INTO EFFECT

MEASURES PASSED BY LEGISLA-
TURE NOT CARRYING EMER-
GENCY CLAUSE, AND NOT RE-
FERRED, BEGIN WORK TODAY.

SALEM, May 21.—Three hundred and fifty brand new laws are in effect in Oregon today, thanks to the 1917 session of the state legislature. Measures which did not carry emergency clauses or were not referred to the people went into effect at the stroke of 12 o'clock, or just 90 days after the adjournment of the legislative session.

These new laws cover a wide range from trivial subjects to matters of considerable importance. The new insurance code, which embodied an entirely new draft of laws for the regulation of insurance companies doing business in Oregon, went into effect. Another measure of similar nature is the law creating the office of state fire marshal, and prescribing his powers and duties.

FEDERAL COAL CONTROL ASKED

TRADE COMMISSION DECLARES
THAT OPERATORS ARE CHARG-
ING SEVERAL HUNDRED PER
CENT OVER PRODUCTION COST.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—Charging that mine operators are charging exorbitant prices for coal, often several hundred per cent over the cost of production, the Federal Trade commission today urged Congress to establish control and give the government's agents power to fix prices.

The commission declared that the coal operators "doctored the books," and that vast discrepancies were found between the actual cost at the mine and the recorded prices. Regulation of coal distribution from the mine to the ultimate consumer, with the authority to allot coal to various classes of consumers, was urged.

STATE SCHOOL LAW MAKES MIXUP HERE

State Superintendent Churchill Is
Asked for Instructions on Change
to First Class District.

Because the new state law fails to authorize the election of a school director to take the place of a retiring school board member when a district is changed from the second to the first class, H. J. Overturf, clerk of the Bend district, has written to State Superintendent of Education J. A. Churchill, asking for advice on the question. Bend will be voted a first class district at the annual school election, June 18, at which time two additional board members must be elected. The term of R. M. Smith expires this year, but Mr. Overturf is unable to state after examining the law, whether Mr. Smith will remain in office or whether a new director is to be chosen to fill his place.

The only other matter of importance which can be voted on at the election is the school levy for the following year, but it is probable that this will be postponed until fall, when a better idea of the amount needed will be had by the board.

OFFICERS' RESERVE OBJECT OF PLOTTERS

ROBERT E. STRAHORN PASSES
65TH BIRTHDAY, BUT WORKS

Strahorn, whose latest proposal for railroad building from Bend has yet to receive a definite reply, is working harder than ever before, according to the Spokane Daily Chronicle, which printed the following when Mr. Strahorn celebrated his sixty-fifth birthday a few days ago:

"Work at your daily task harder and do it better than ever before, is the advice of Robert E. Strahorn, railroad and empire builder and millionaire, who today is quietly celebrating his sixty-fifth birthday anniversary with his family at his palatial home in Browne's addition. "Hammer away at the thing you are doing and do it as you have never done it before," said Mr. Strahorn today. Do the things that are reasonable, but do them with a might and so well that they will stand out as your contribution in this time of stress and strain.

Keep Up Program.

"Believing that a man of 65 can render no greater service to the country than to conservatively persist in any reasonable development program he adopted before we entered the war, I am celebrating my anniversary by pushing my new railway project, designed to open up for production many millions of acres of rich lands in Central Oregon and Northern California and Nevada.

"We will build only so much of the system as was arranged for before war conditions became so acute, but this will encourage production and afford an outlet for large quantities of grain and other provisions and lumber which otherwise would not be produced."

Mr. Strahorn enjoys excellent health and today is receiving congratulations from his many friends here and elsewhere throughout the country.

GERMAN SHIPS WIN OUTPOST SEA FIGHT

One French Vessel Slightly Damaged
While German Torpedo Boats
Escape Unharm.

LONDON, May 21.—An outpost engagement between German and French torpedo boats was officially reported both in Berlin and Paris statements issued today. One French vessel was slightly damaged, according to the Paris statement.

Berlin described the fight as "a short outpost engagement off Flanders," declaring that "the French ships were repeatedly hit, while ours were undamaged."

38 MERCHANTMEN ARE CONTRACTED FOR
