SELLARS IS FIRST TO APPLY FOR BATTERY

The first response to the call made by P. H. Brooks for volunteers to form a battery of mountain artillery in Bend was made by George T. Sellars. Because he was over age and married, Mr. Brooks asked that a letter be obtained from his wife giving her consent to the enlistment in case the battery were formed, and later in the day the letter was received not only assenting to Mr. Sellars' action but pointing the finger of scorn at the slacker, married or single, who did not heed his country's call.

Before leaving last night for Portland on business connected with the formation of the battery, Mr. Brooks spoke highly of Mrs. Sellars' action saying that he intended to bring it to the attention of Adjutant General White. A wire from him this morning indicated that married men may enlist if wives waive all pecuniary claims.

Mr. Brooks is now preparing a circular to mail to all the men in the county eligible to conscription, calling to their attention the proposed formation of the battery.
