"BRAYLESS" MULE IS PRODUCED BY FRENCH

American Pack Animals Rendered Silent and Efficient by Operation on Nostrils.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN THE FIELD, July 6.—Uncle Sam rendered France a great service in letting her have his mules—at a very good price—but France has returned the service a thousand times by solving the secret of a brayless mule. When the American pack mule arrived in France to "do his bit" he of course brought his bray with him. The mule was welcome, but the bray—well, any unusual sound on a battlefield is undesirable. It might tip off the Boche to a surprise attack. In an effort to put an end to the nightly "love song" of the pack mule the French military officers decided to separate the sexes, and all gentlemen mules were retained for service in one sector while all the lady mules were taken off for service in a more distant region. This produced very marked results. Nevertheless there still remained certain mules who either from force of habit or from conviction that both their love and their voice were so strong that their lady loves would hear them no matter how far away they might be, persisted in making the welkin ring with a gigantic bray just at the time and place when it would give the "Boches" the right cue for sending in a hall of shells, grenades and rifle fire. The habits and temperament of the mule were then subjected to further and more profound study by the French, and this time with more happy results. It was found that a very slight operation performed on the nostrils of a mule would render him as silent as a wrecked phonograph, and since then the American mules in the Vosges have met all requirements that could possibly be exacted from them.

CITIZENS MOBILIZE TO PROTECT MINES

Arizona Civilians Drilled in Handling Firearms—Defense is Aided by Machine Guns.

Armed guards are being stationed at the Old Dominion property, and it is reported that small arms are being augmented by the addition of machine guns.

JACK BRITTON STILL FAVORITE WITH FANS

At Age of 32, Welterweight Is Yet in Top Notch Class—Many K. O.'s to His Credit.

By H. C. Hamilton, (United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, July 6.—Jack Britton is 32 years old.

With a margin of seven or eight years over most of the top-notch scrappers in the United States, Britton has been successfully defending the title of welterweight champion against all comers. After he decided he wanted to be king among the 142-pounders, Britton hasn't barred anyone. Twelve times he met Ted Lewis, the hard-hitting and shifty Englishman and finally met him in a 20-round affair at Dayton, only to lose the championship.

Britton, whose name is William J. Breslin, began fighting in 1905. He met all of them, beginning with the little fellows and working his way straight through the lightweight class. The best of them were never too good for him. He was credited with being the cleverest lightweight in the game, aside from Packey McFarland, who undoubtedly was a

welterweight even in the best days of his lightweight career. Britton was charged with being a dancing master sort of boxer—one of the decidedly unpopular Freddie Welsh type, but his record shows plenty of knockouts over some of the toughest boys who ever fought in the divisions he went through.

SOUTHERN CHINA IS AGAINST MONARCHY

Provinces Show Disapproval by Establishing a Provisional Government at Nanking.

LONDON, July 6.—Southern China provinces have established a provisional government at Nanking, according to a Reuter dispatch received here today. The news indicated secession by the southern tier of Chinese states as the result of the attempt to restore the monarchy at Peking.

Northern China is not extending as great support to the new emperor as had been expected, and advices indicate that the attempted restoration may result in failure.
