"BRAYLESS" MULE IS PRODUCED BY FRENCH

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN THE FIELD, July 6-Uncle Sam rendered France a great service in letting her have his mules—at a very good price-but France has returned the service a thousand times by solving the secret of a brayless mule. When the American pack mule
