AUTO LICENSES.

Confirmation of arguments advanced during last spring's campaign for the highway bonds is found in the number of auto licenses now issued in Oregon. A news report says, "Automobile licenses are increasing in number far in excess of what was estimated when the campaign for the \$6,000,000 road bonds was made. State Highway Commissioner Adams says that in his arguments in the campaign he estimated that there would be an increase of 20 per cent and that this would take care of the bonds, principal and interest, but today in Portland he saw an Oregon machine whose license number-46,000-shows that there has been an increase of 35 per cent-almost twice the increase anticipated."
