RECORD OF POWER PLANT IS UNUSUAL

Local Public Service Company Ceases Operation Only Twice Since June, 1913.

Although its plant here has been in operation since June, 1913, the Bend Water, Light & Power Company's equipment has never suffered a single breakdown. This was the unusual fact discovered today by Manager T. H. Foley, after running through the records of the company. Similar plants in other cities are often to shut down because of accidents two or more times a year, and Mr. Foley knocked on some wood when he announced the remarkable record of the local public service corporation.

Only twice has the plant ceased operation only for a few minutes, once last January when the machinery was stopped for 20 minutes to avoid damage by anchor ice, and once in August, when the power was turned off during a heavy electrical storm to avoid damage threatened by an excessive electrical load.

One feature which has contributed to the excellent service given by the company is the closed circle transmission system used here. The power wires from the plant make a complete circle, so that if a wire is broken at any point, the electricity will feed up to the break from both sides. The central location of the plant, Mr. Foley considers as especially advantageous, when compared to conditions prevailing in many other cities in Oregon.

AEROPLANE CORPS IS OPEN FOR RECRUITING

Word was received today from the general recruiting station at Portland by Corporal Harvey to the effect that the aviation section of the signal corps is now open for enlistments. Training in flying is to be given only to commissioned officers but the new men will be instructed in the construction and repairing of aeroplanes. After enlistment at Vancouver Barracks all accepted applicants will be sent to Fort Sam Houston, Texas.
