

MAY IRRIGATE 11,000 ACRES

PETITION IS HELD IN ABEYANCE.

Extension of North Canal, and Withdrawal of Watered Lands From District Now Being Formed Among the Features.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 16.—(Special.)—The Desert Land Board today held in abeyance the petition of 99 settlers on the Central Oregon project asking to be allowed to reclaim 9000 acres of land outside of the project and altogether open 12,000 acres of land.

Plans, which if carried out, will mean the immediate irrigation of 11,000 acres east of Bend in the Powell Butte section not now receiving water, are under consideration by the Central Oregon Irrigation Company and committees of settlers representing the owners of the lands affected.

The necessity of having the lands watered included in the district arises from the fact that they are now mired in with the dry lands to be served, and can be administered more efficiently by one management centrally located in the district.

Water for the new land would be provided by the release of water rights on land now segregated, partly reclaimed, but not sold, the largest portion coming from the North canal unit, this land being in turn thrown open to homestead entry.

The move for the creation of a district follows the request for water made by owners of 9000 acres of dry land above the present canal.
