CHALLENGE SENT WINNER OF MATCH
Brooks-Taylor Fight Friday Night Will Pick Man to Enter Ring With Fred Gilbert.

Fred Gilbert, undefeated Bend middleweight, will fight the winner of the Percy Brooks-Roscoe Taylor match to be staged at the Hippodrome on the night of Friday, October 19. This was the announcement today of Brooks, after wiring Gilbert to accept the conditional challenge. Gilbert has been away from Bend since he won from Jack Wagner on a foul early in the summer.

Preparations are complete for Friday night's go at the Hippodrome and Brooks is in first class condition for the bout, he declares. Taylor is expected to arrive in Bend tonight or tomorrow.

Betting on the coming scrap is light so far, as there is little on which to base ratings of comparative ability. Brooks believes that he will be able to win out in the course of the 19 rounds, but says that he will have a stiff battle.
