## BUY A LIBERTY BOND. FLYING SQUADRON MAKES RETURN TRIP

Southern Towns Contribute Generously—Lakeview Has Largest Meeting of Any Town.

On their return trip from Klamath Falls members of the "Flying Squadron," who toured Central Oregon for the benefit of the Liberty Loan, stopped in Bend last night. They left this morning in their big yellow car for Eugene.

Since leaving Bend the party stopped at Klamath Falls, Merrill, Lakeview, Paisley, Silver Lake, Burns and Drewsey. On the entire trip \$200,000 in actual money was taken in at the meetings. Lakeview showed the largest turnout. At Burns, their last stop, \$43,000 was taken in by 10 o'clock and before they left town at 11 the sum of \$100,000 had been pledged.
