M. card in my pocket as long as I have coin to pay everything."

Coe's testimonial, to the efficiency of the Y. M. C. A. organization on the western battlefield overseas, is typical of what America's defenders of democracy think of the "Y."

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT IS ILL WITH FEVER

Guard at Houses Quarantined Last Week May Be Removed Tomorrow.

Another case of scarlet fever was discovered today when Paul Brookings, a high school student, residing at the home of H. G. Farris, in Park Addition, was placed under quarantine. It is thought by the attending physician that only Mrs. Farris was exposed to contagion and that it will not be necessary to fumigate the high school. A strict quarantine has been placed on the home, even the dog being locked up.

No other cases have come to the notice of the city physician. Schools have reopened and will continue in operation, so far as is known. Four houses are still under quarantine guard, officers being stationed on the streets to prevent intercourse with the inmates. The guard will probably be removed tomorrow unless the doctors order otherwise. Two other houses have already been released from quarantine.

MOONEY PROBE GIVES NEW DEVELOPMENTS

Sensational disclosures are promised. It is reported that the President will be asked to pardon Mooney and Billings.
