Notice is hereby given, To the legal voters of School District No. 1, of Deschutes County, State of Oregon, that a School Meeting of said District will be held at Room 17, O'Kane Building, Bend, Oregon, on the 5th day of December, 1917, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

Expert Will Have Charge of Demonstration to Be Made at Bend Garage On Saturday.
