Central Oregon must be booming, judging from the number of land-seekers that have been in this community during the last few weeks.

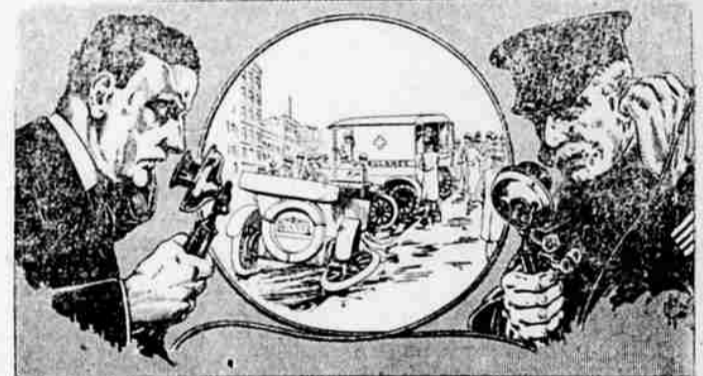
