In a letter recently received from Willard Houston, now in the eleventh aero squad at Belleville, Illinois, he encloses a poem, written by a Bend boy in the same company and evidently printed in a paper published in the camp.

Mr. Houston has been at Belleville the past six weeks and says he is expecting to leave for France soon. His company is quarantined for measles just at present.

The following is the clipping which he sent. The writer refused to divulge the name of its author.

"ONLY A VOLUNTEER."

I am no honor man, just a plain volunteer,
T'was but a few to greet me, when I left with a cheer;
It was a very few days after war was declared,
The neighbors thought, my life I despaired.

All my pals on the corner, I could see with a glance,
Pictured me dead, in the trenches in France;
