MEDICAL ADVISORS PREPARED FOR DRAFT

First Meeting of Board Held This Week—Dr. Vandevert Chosen Permanent Secretary.

The medical advisory board is now ready to aid in the work of classifying registered men for the next draft. At a meeting called Tuesday by Dr. U. C. Coe, chairman of the board, the six members were all present to discuss the preliminary work. Dr. J. C. Vandevert was elected permanent secretary.

In order to facilitate the work to be carried on by the Prineville and Bend boards a certain sum was allowed for automobile hire and arrangements will be made with the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company to handle all board messages free of charge. The government has already provided that this be done with the Western Union, but service of the latter company does not reach Prineville.

The physicians present at the meeting were Drs. Coe, Vandevert and W. W. Faulkner, of Bend, and C. S. Edwards, E. O. Hyde and H. G. Davis, of Prineville.

BOY DESCRIBES LIFE IN TRAINING SCHOOL

Robert Innes Writes Interesting Letter, Telling of Duties at Mare Island.

A glimpse of life in a naval training station is given in a letter just received from Robert Innes, now in the yard craft supply office at Mare Island, by his father. It reads as follows:

"I am in the pay office yet and, believe me, I am working some, too, for we are making up the pay roll and it is no snap, but I am getting it fine and like it too.

"The weather up here is a great deal different from that at Goat Island and I like it much better. We have to get out and do a quarter of a mile run every morning. I don't expect to go out on a draft for some time, but think I will stay right here in the pay office, as the work is fine. The chief told me it ought not take very long for me to make my second class rating. Probably in a month or two I will get a chance to go up and by that time will have so much experience it will be easy to make my rating. Harvey is taking an examination for his rating and Steve Steidl expects to take his soon."
