

SPEECH STIRS ALL OF EMPIRE

OPPOSITION IS SMOLDERING IN AUSTRIA.

Cabinet at Vienna Resigns—Papal Nuncio Says People Are Roused By the Recent Speech of President Wilson.

ROME, Jan. 21.—The Papal nuncio to Vienna reports to the Vatican that Austria-Hungary, stirred by President Wilson's outline of the war aims of the United States, is smoldering with opposition to the militarist policies of Germany. It is understood that he described the situation as "most critical for the Teutonic military combine," referring to the alliance of the two countries.

It is asserted that the Wilson speech has given remarkable impetus to democratic peace ideas in Austria and industrial chaos of more than a local nature has been reported.

Grave differences have developed between Emperor Karl and the pan-German leaders and messages state that the Kaiser is trying to smooth the difference by supporting Foreign Minister von Kuehlmann against von Buelow, whom the Austrian hates.

MINISTRY RESIGNS.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 21.—The Austrian ministry has resigned, according to a dispatch from Vienna to the Berliner Morgenpost. It is reported that Count Vontoggenburg, minister of the interior, is attempting to reform the cabinet.

WAR CABINET BILL INTRODUCED TODAY

President Wilson Is Opposed to the Measure Fostered by Senator Chamberlain.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—In face of President Wilson's opposition Senator Chamberlain introduced the war cabinet bill, following the democratic conference at which Wilson voiced his disapproval. The bill is expected to cause one of the most vigorous fights in the history of Congress. Wilson is calling upon the leaders of both houses, apparently asking them to help frustrate the measure.

ALL GERMANS MUST REGISTER

PROCLAMATION IS ISSUED BY PRESIDENT CALLING FOR INFORMATION CONCERNING EVERY ALIEN IN COUNTRY.

"By proclamation of the President of the United States, all German aliens are hereby notified that all natives, citizens, denizens, or subjects of the German Empire or Imperial German government, being males of the age of 14 years and upwards on registration day, who are within the United States and not actually naturalized as American citizens, are required to register as alien enemies.

"The dates of registration, within the State of Oregon, have been fixed by the attorney general of the United States to commence at 6:00 a. m., on February 4, and to continue on each day successively thereafter between the hours of 6:00 a. m. and 8:00 p. m. up to and including February 8, 1918, at 8:00 p. m.

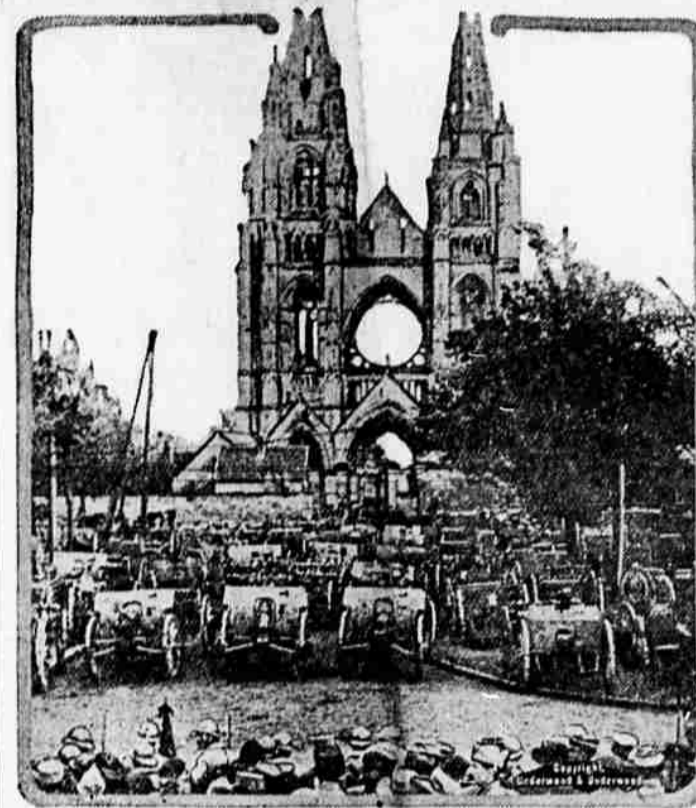
"All German aliens residing or being within the city of Bend or vicinity are hereby required to present themselves for registration at the postoffice in said city to the postmaster, who has been designated by the attorney general as assistant registrar of said city, and to complete their registration on or before the 9th day of February, 1918, at 8:00 p. m.

"Any German alien, required to register, who fails to complete his registration within the time fixed therefor, or who violates, or attempts (Continued on page 3.)

UNIFORMITY IN DRAFT DESIRED

CASES WHERE DEFERRED CLASSIFICATION HAS BEEN GRANTED MEN MARRIED SINCE MAY 18, 1917, MUST BE APPEALED.

PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—Government appeal agents are directed, in an order just issued by the provost marshal-general at Washington, to appeal to a district board every case where a draft registrant who has married since May 18, 1917, has been granted deferred classification by his local board on account of being married.

This does not mean that the government is seeking to revoke deferred classifications granted to men who have married since May 18, 1917. The main purpose of the order, it is announced, is to obtain uniformity of action in handling applications for deferred classification by men who have married since the selective draft law went into effect.

At the same time district boards will give careful scrutiny to each such case. If local boards appear to have been too lenient in their interpretation of the regulations in this connection, reversal of their ruling may be expected by the district board before which the case is taken, or the case may be sent back to the local board for additional evidence.

Here is the language of the regulations in regard to men who have married since the law became effective: "On May 18, 1917, every person subject to registration had notice of his obligation to render military service to his country. The purpose of the selective service law was not to suspend the institution of marriage among registrants, but boards should scrutinize marriages since May 18, 1917, and especially those hastily effected since that time, to determine whether the marriage relation was entered into with a primary view of evading military service, and unless such is found not to be the case, boards are hereby authorized to disregard the relationship so established as a condition of dependency requiring deferred classification under these regulations."

NEWLY MARRIED MEN NOT TO BE EXEMPTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—General Crowder announced today that registered men married since May 18 will not be exempted. He instructed federal agents to appeal to district boards all cases where the local boards had granted these exemptions for dependency. It was also announced that undrafted registrants will not be permitted to enlist in the allied armies, pending a call to American service.

Famous Cruisers Of Turkish Fleet Are Lost In Fight

LONDON, Jan. 21.—British and Turkish ships fought at the trace of the Dardanelles early today. The Turkish cruiser Midulla, formerly the German cruiser, Breslau, was sunk and the cruiser, Sultan Selim, at one time its sister ship, the Goeben, was beached. Aircraft then attacked the stranded vessel. The British lost two monitors in the battle. The Midulla and the Sultan Selim were the two principal ships in the Turkish fleet, being of recent construction and intended for the Teutonic squadron. Several years ago they were sold by the Germans and the names changed. Both figured largely in the news of ocean raids before becoming Turkish possessions.

MONEY NEEDED FOR RAILROADS

McADOO ASKS SENATE FOR ONE BILLION DOLLARS TO BE USED IN IMPROVEMENTS TO PUT ROADS ON WAR BASIS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo told the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee that one billion dollars must be advanced for railroad improvements before the lines can be placed on an effective war basis. He forecasted a continuation of federal control when he said that Congress should not limit the government control to any definite period, saying that financial chaos is likely to result from it. He stated that he did not believe in government ownership but believed that a greater measure of federal control would be necessary hereafter. McAdoo said the Garfield fuel order will probably be discontinued after 30 days.

MINIMUM FIXED ON COAST PORK PRICE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 21.—By a voluntary agreement of the Pacific Coast packers with the food administration, the minimum price on hogs in the three far western states was fixed at one cent under the federal minimum in the Chicago market. The price in the eastern city is now \$15.50 per hundredweight.

ALLIES HARRASSING TEUTONIC TROOPS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—Secretary of War Baker announced that the allies are harrassing the Teutons massed for the assault on the western front. They are taking the initiative pending the opening of hostilities on a massive scale. The position of the menaced Italians has been greatly improved.

Owing to the fact that the last legislature made no reapportionment as to senatorial and representative districts, Deschutes county will remain in the same districts in those respects as before it was created. The 17th Senatorial District includes Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties, and the 21st Senatorial District includes the same counties. UKRAINIA WILL COME TO TERMS

AGREES TO SEPARATE PEACE.

Blow Struck at Bolsheviki Plans—Germany Is Jubilant Over Pact With Smaller Nation—Assembly Is Dissolved.

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 21.—Berlin reports that Ukraina has agreed to a separate basis for peace with Germany. Germany is jubilant over the pact with Ukraina. That the smaller country will act apart from Russia is a severe blow to the hopes of the Bolsheviki. Trotsky previously stated that he could not allow the Ukrainian delegates to treat independently the question of occupied territory, nevertheless, he did so anyway.

CONFERENCE NOT CLOSED.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 21.—It is reported that Trotsky before leaving Brest-Litovsk last week told Kuehlmann he must not consider the peace negotiations discontinued, declaring that they would be resumed again in a week. Berlin newspapers say he must either accept or reject the Teuton demands or the conferences will cease.

ASSEMBLY IS DISSOLVED.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Bolsheviki today dissolved the constituent assembly.

BLIZZARD IN TEXAS IS CAUSING DEATHS
