West Virginia.

The present state of West Virginia was originally and for a long time part of the state of Virginia. The presidential election in 1860 showed that a majority of the people of Virginia were opposed to seceding from the Union, but when President Lincoln issued his call for troops a state convention passed an ordinance of secession without waiting for a popular vote. Later it was ratified by the people of the eastern part of Virginia and repudiated by those of the western part. Thus the secession, or attempted secession of Virginia from the Union led to the separation of West Virginia from old Virginia and the formation of a new state.

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gon, You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this Summons, to-wit: On or before the 30th day of March, 1918, and if you fail so to do, for want thereof, the plaintiff will take judgment against you, and will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in the complaint herein, to-wit:

For a decree that the plaintiff is the owner in fee simple of Lot 11, of Block 14, Deschutes County, Oregon, according to the recorded plat thereof now on file in the office of the County Clerk in and for said County and State; and that the defendant has no right, title or interest in, or lien or claim upon the real property above described, or any part thereof, and that the plaintiff's title to said real property be quieted against said defendant, and that said defendant

be forever barred from asserting any claim or interest in or to said premises, or any part thereof adverse to those plaintiff; and for the costs and disbursements of this suit and for such other and further relief as to the court may seem equitable in the premises.

Service of this Summons is made upon you by publication thereof in the Bend Bulletin for six consecutive

weeks, by virtue of an order made by the Honorable T. E. J. Duffy, Judge of the above entitled court on the 11th day of February, 1918. The date of the first publication is February 13, 1918.
