CAR SITUATION IS GOOD IN BEND MILLS

The following is a clipping from The Timberman:
"The car situation with the Bend mills has been fairly good, due to the fact that four railroads serve the Bend mills. In January the Shevlin-Hixon company shipped 8,500,000 feet and the Brooks-Scanlon company over five million feet. The cut of Bend for 1917 aggregated 185 million feet as follows:
Shevlin-Hixon Co. 103,000,000
Brooks-Scanlon Co. 65,000,000
Pine Tree Lbr. Co. 7,000,000
Small mills 7,000,000
"It is anticipated that Bend will cut in excess of 200 million feet. There has been practically no snow and the mills are operating."

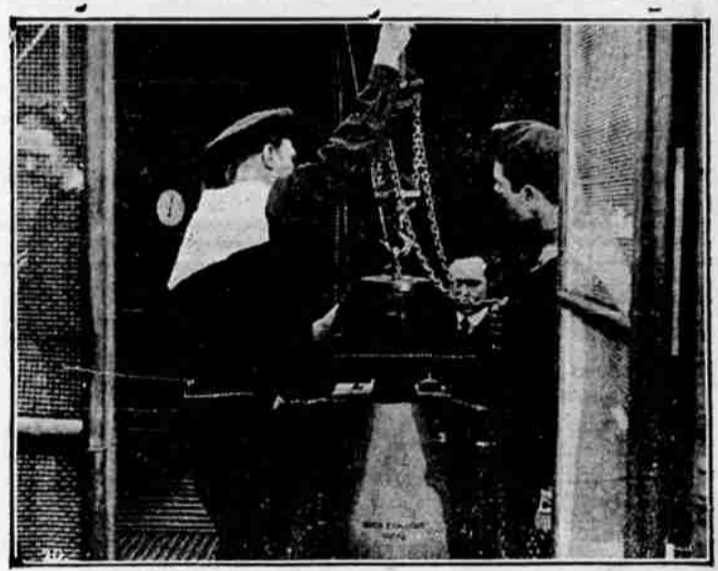
CLARENCE ORR WRITES.

arship standing of each student by means of graphs on file in the office. If a poor student shows a rise in his work in three weeks he may continue as they are, if not he drops one course.
Noise in the assembly hall before classes is not permitted, in order that those coming early may study.
A check is kept on pupils in the assembly hall so that an absentee slip may be turned in.
Any student proving unsatisfactory in one class is automatically suspended from all and must promise to behave before readmittance.
Welfare Is First.
"Don't let the child's will be first. Make his welfare the foremost consideration," said Mr. Grant, in closing. Answering inquiries from C. L. Simpson, Mr. Sanders, and others, he explained the manner in which the recent difficulties in the high school had been handled and said each pupil had an opportunity to hold a conference before being suspended from school.
Miss Helen Manny, Miss Mabel Lorence, R. M. Smith, Carl Johnson, J. P. Keyes, City School Superintendent F. Thordarson and H. J. Overturf all spoke on the matter.
