Chaplain Gilbert Writes That Third Oregon, Now in France, Needs Cotton Cloths.

Asking assistance from the women of Bend in providing dish towels and tobacco for the Third Oregon in France, the Oregon Army and Navy Auxiliary has written Mrs. G. W. Shriner, formerly of this city. Mrs. Shriner has forwarded the letter to The Bulletin in hopes that the request will be heeded.

The note written by the president of the organization reads: "We have just received an appeal from Chaplain Gilbert, of the Third Oregon, now in France, asking for 5000 dish towels and smoking tobacco. We are asking you to enlist your friends and some of your organizations to assist us in supplying this need. You know dish towels cannot be bought in France, even though they have the money. Cotton is very scarce on the other side. If you can assist us, send these things at once and you will be helping the good work."

The towels could be sent Mrs. Shriner at 375 N. E. Fifteenth street in Portland or to the Auxiliary in the same city.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.--The American hen is strutting forth from the back yard and farm to join the American forces fighting the Germans.

"The hen will win the war," comes from no less a reliable source than the Department of Agriculture.

To this is added an appeal from the Department to the farmers to increase their production of chickens and eggs, so as to save more meat to send abroad, for the use of America's fighting men.

"The hen must take her place among those who are helping to win the war for democracy. The hen, of course, always has shown a willingness to do her duty, and doubtless she is willing now," the Department of Agriculture says.

The stimulus given farmers to increase the poultry production will result in a nation of egg and chicken enthusiasts, leaving more meat to embark at Atlantic ports to combat the German howitzers.



The explosion is shown first from the interior of the Zeppelin cage and then the mammoth cigar-shaped dirigible is seen in its descent through the clouds.

Another stunning effect shown just previous to the destruction of the Zeppelin, shows the big ship traveling through the air at night dropping its deadly bombs on the sleeping city below.

**Over the Top**  
By an American Soldier Who Went ARTHUR GUY EMPEY

When the Lusitania was sunk Arthur Guy Empey decided that he could not wait for his country to declare war -- so he sailed without orders for England, and enlisted as a Canadian.
