

## DAVID DUNN STABS MAN WITH KNIFE

GROVER CALDWELL IS  
WOUNDED 4 TIMES

### WEAPON DISCARDED

Rancher from Imperial Involved in  
Killing Shortly After Arrival  
in Town—Hearing  
Today.

David Dunn at a hearing this afternoon entered a plea of not guilty. He was lodged in jail without bond and the trial was set for tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Striking at his adversary with a knife, David Dunn of Imperial slashed Grover Caldwell's body in four places when the two men met in front of Myers' rooming house on Bond street about 8 o'clock last night. The cause of the quarrel is as yet unknown, both of the men telling entirely different stories concerning it. Night Officer Frank Culp was called and lodged Dunn in jail, while the other man was sent to Dr. Vandever for medical attention. It was found that he had received serious flesh wounds, it being necessary to take seven stitches in his face and 35 in two wounds on his left arm. The big muscles were severed and the arteries in the wrist cut. The thumb on the left hand was also gashed and a big wound made in his abdomen.

#### Had Just Arrived.

Dunn had just come in from Black on the evening train and was walking down Bond street with another man, Caldwell, accompanied by his brother Ralph, turned into the same street at the corner by the Two Jims resort. Here he left his companions and went on until he overtook Dunn. The man with Dunn went into the lodging house to procure a room.

According to the story Caldwell tells, he knew Dunn had been looking up a horse and he casually inquired if he had found out who it belonged to.

"Yes, it's mine," the rancher replied, striking the one who had made the inquiry. Caldwell hit him back, knocking him to his knees. When Dunn came up he drew his knife.

#### Tells Different Story.

Dunn told Sheriff Roberts that Caldwell walked up to him as he stood on the sidewalk and struck him. He claims he drew the knife in self-defense and not until after he had been hit in the head.

Evidently there had been some deeper interest in the horse at Black than either of the men were willing to admit. Ralph Caldwell says, so far as he knew, his brother and Dunn were perfect strangers, the latter having only a chance knowledge of the horse, which was kept at some Smith ranch on the Columbia river.

#### Knife Not on Dunn.

No knife was found on Dunn when he was taken into custody, but one which appeared to have been freshly washed was found on his companion, who is not, however, supposed to have had anything to do with the act.

Both Dunn and Caldwell are notorious characters from the High Desert and have kept the circuit court busy the last year. The former was before the last term on a horse-stealing charge, but was acquitted. Caldwell is the man accused of the theft of a steer from U. S. Bushnell, of Powell Butte, and comes before the grand jury next month. Both are old-timers in this section.

Dunn is the first prisoner to occupy the new county jail. He was brought up in Judge Easton's court this afternoon for a hearing.

## ENEMY ADVANCE ON WEST FRONT

FIGHTING QUICKENING ALONG  
ENTIRE LINE—HAND-TO-HAND  
BATTLE NORTH OF VERDUN—  
NUMEROUS BOMBARDMENTS.

BRITISH FRONT, March 21.—The enemy is reported as advancing at several points between St. Quentin and Scarpe. Infantry penetrated the British front lines north of Lamplcourt and Lourval, advancing to the edge of the Cambrai salient through Gache wood and near Croiselle-sur-Villers.

Berlin reports that the Austro-German forces are active on the whole west front.

#### GERMANS BOMBARD.

PARIS, March 21.—An unceasing German bombardment started today in northeast and southeast sectors on the French front and also in Champagne. French and American artillery frustrated the Champagne bombardments.

North of Verdun the German infantry was repelled after fierce hand-to-hand fighting.

## ALLIES PUSH BACK SUCCESSFUL RAIDS

## FOUR DEAD FROM MANLEY COLLISION

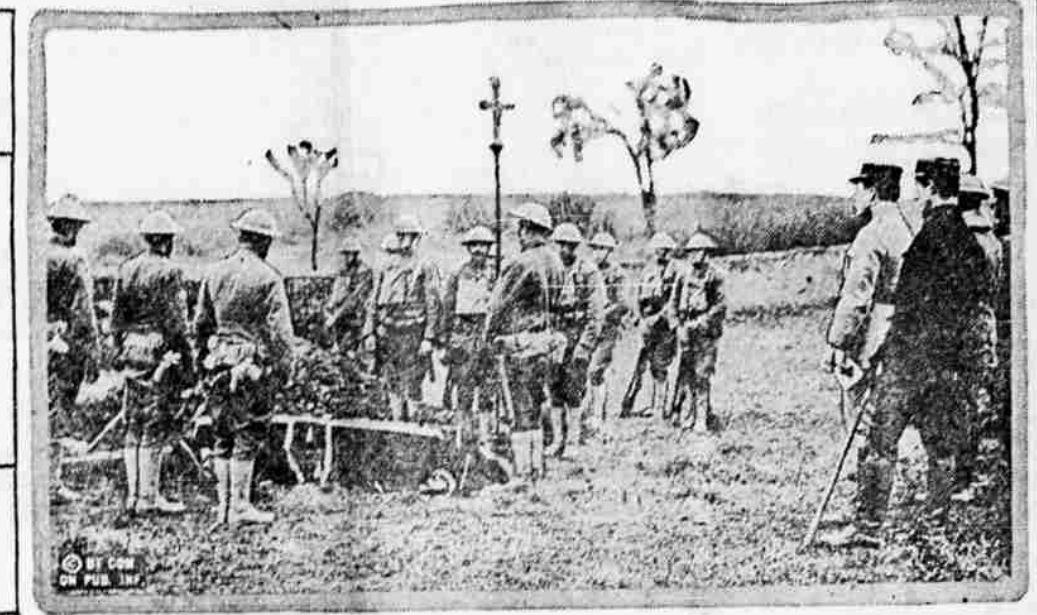

## STATE POLICE SYSTEM CREATED BY BOARD

Four Companies May Be Divided in  
Squads—Deficiency Is  
Incurred.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—All Dutch shipping in American ports has been seized by Great Britain, which country acted despite Holland's refusal to reach an agreement.

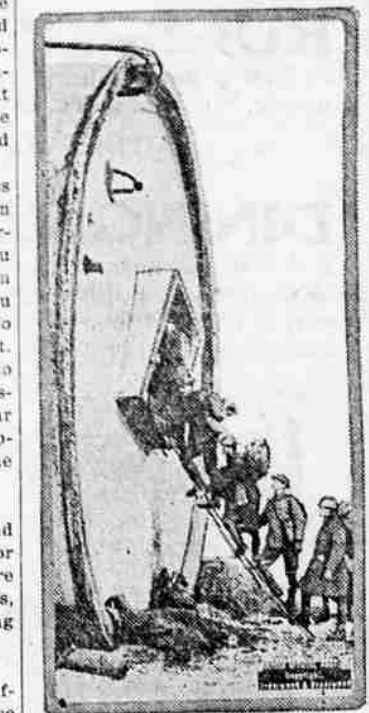
#### BLOCKADE THREATENED.

## LENINE CAUSED PLAN TO FAIL

TROTSKY'S SCHEME IS  
MADE PUBLIC.

Appeal Was to Have Been Made to  
German People—Ukraine and  
Austria Quarrel Over  
Volin Province.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Word of the bold efforts of Trotsky to launch in the Teuton nation's revolution to save Russian democracy reached the government today. The "trump card" failed because Lenin tipped off the Slavs' hand.

Trotsky had staked all on the revolution in Germany, refusing to yield to Lenin's plan of abject surrender of Russian rights. He prolonged the Brest-Litovsk meetings as he worked for a grand coup.

On the appointed day Lenin did not accompany Trotsky to Brest-Litovsk. The appeal to the German people was stopped by military men before it had reached the soldiers and most people. It is significant that industrial riots followed.

Though the effort failed, it will go down in history as one of the most unique documents of the war.

#### SERIOUS DIFFERENCES.

## ENEMY SQUADRON SHELLS DUNKIRK

## INSURANCE MAY BE EXTENDED BY BILL

## GORE AMENDMENT ADOPTED BY SENATE

## WAR FINANCE BILL PASSED BY HOUSE
