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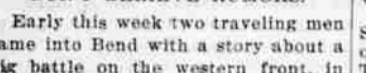

DON'T BELIEVE RUMORS.

Early this week two traveling men came into Bend with a story about a big battle on the western front, in which thousands of Americans were losing their lives or being captured. The tale spread rapidly and before many hours had reached even Prineville and La Pine, the story being enlarged upon with each repetition. It later proved to be nothing but idle gossip.

Finding that Oregon communities are being fed up on falsehoods of various kinds, that the people here as elsewhere are repeating these stories for truth and are thus creating a morale that is injurious to the cause which brought the United States to declare war on Germany, the administration at Washington is asking the people of this state to refrain from passing judgment on the way the war is being won, or from saying and doing things that will destroy confidence.

Don't believe rumors that are peddled about surreptitiously.

All war news will be given out at Washington.

Don't talk too much, anyway.

SHOP ROOM SHELVES EMPTYING RAPIDLY

Commission Rumor Is Denied—Red Cross Has New Lunch Counter to Sell.

It is thought that some pro-German sympathizers have been circulating information around to the effect that the Red Cross Superfluity shop is taking 50 per cent. commission instead of 10 per cent. on all goods sold there and for this reason some of the goods have been withdrawn. Mrs. H. K. Brooks, in charge of the place, has specially requested that this rumor be denied.

The shop sends out a call for salads, pies and cakes and for articles to fill up the shelves with merchandise, which are rapidly being emptied. Old clothes would be desirable donations just at present.

A lunch counter completely equipped and brand new was presented to the shop, but owing to lack of space it could not be used. It is now on sale and anyone desiring to make such an investment should make inquiries there.

In the bank there is now \$290 to the credit of the shop in the short time, less than two weeks, it has been in operation.

WILL HOLD EXAMINATION.

The United States civil service commission announces that an examination will be held in 54 cities in the states of Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Washington and Wyoming for the purpose of filling vacancies in the reclamation service and other branches requiring similar qualifications in the position of bookkeeper. Both men and women will be admitted. Appointing salaries range from \$900 to \$1,200 per annum. Date of examination is April 1, 1918. FARMERS LOCATING HORSES FOR CAVALRY

Second Inspection Day Coming April 3—Prices Please Those Who Sell Mounts.
REDMOND, March 21.—County Agricultural Agent R. A. Ward is arranging for the second series of war horse inspections which will be held in Crook and Deschutes counties early in April by the war department. The dates for inspections are: Bend, April 3; Prineville, April 5; Redmond, April 6.
The county agricultural council members have been notified and are now locating horses and urging owners to take them to inspection points. The call this time is for cavalry horses weighing between 1,000 pounds and 1,200 pounds, and wheel mules weighing over 1,200.
Mr. Ward reports that farmers

were well pleased with the prices they received at the last inspections and will make every effort to furnish animals this time. Prices of \$140 for cavalry horses and \$215 for wheel mules were paid at the last inspection.
The next inspections will be made by Captain Frank S. Von Stado of the quartermaster corps.
