EUROPEANS WILL
FLEE IF HUNS WINEurope Would Be a Place Where
Living Would Not Be
Worth While.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.)
ZURICH, Switzerland, July 23.—
(By Mail.)—Should Germany suc-
ceed in domination of Europe, a gen-
eral exodus of the populations of
the subjugated countries would re-
sult, according to Dr. Muehlion in his
book, "Devastated Europe," just
published.
"If the Germans succeed in estab-
lishing the domination of Europe, we

shall witness the flight of the Euro-
peans," Muehlion writes. "The most
remote corners of Europe will be the
most sought after. If there is no
spot in the old world which escapes
German domination, then there will
be a general exodus toward the coun-
tries across the seas, in all directions
where the Germans are not."

"Europe will be a country where
living conditions will not be worth
while. The Germans will not be al-
lowed to show themselves outside
their new Germania, and everyone
will proudly endeavor to avoid by all
means these horrible objects—the
Germans."

"One cannot think without shud-
dering of the kind of peace which
Prussia would impose on Europe.
Deeper hatred would make Europe
appear as if possessed of the devil.
Prussia will steal all she can and
will do everything to keep it. She
never will remove her foot from the
breast of those she has conquered or
taken by surprise. She will compel
foreign culture to adore her barbarism.
She believes only in the mailed
fist—inside and outside her frontiers."

FOR THE SCREEN

The Dolly Sisters, stars of Metro's
