

BRITISH REACH NEW POINT NEAR OLD HINDENBURG LINE

Australians Make Advance to Within Two and One-Half Miles of St. Quentin Canal

YANKS REPULSE RAIDS ON METZ FRONT

British Fighting in Storm Deliver Heavy Attacks Against Enemy in Region of Lempire Epehey—French Troops Capture City of Brenay, South of St. Quentin—Hun Death Rate Is High.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, Sept. 21.—The Austrians have advanced north of St. Quentin and are now within half a mile of the St. Quentin canal. This is the nearest point to the main defenses on the Hindenburg line which have been reached anywhere between Havrincourt and St. Quentin.

YANKS REPULSE ATTACK.

ON THE METZ FRONT, Sept. 21.—(Noon).—Two heavy German raids, almost large enough to be called attacks, were directed against the right wing of the American line this morning. Both were repulsed. The Germans laid down a barrage along the Bois des Rappes, on the west bank of the Moselle, on a front of two miles. The infantry commenced the advance, but the attack was broken under the heavy American fire. The next raid, in practice the same region, was also quickly stopped.

Eight large fires were observed today in the rear of the German lines near Don Martin la Chaussee, four miles north of Thiacourt. Several points behind the American lines were heavily shelled by the Germans this morning.

BRITISH FIGHT IN STORM.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES, Sept. 21.—The British in the midst of a terrific storm delivered a smashing attack on a three-mile front east of Lempire Epehey this morning, where the Germans are still holding outposts before the Hindenburg line. Spurs leading from the outposts on the ridge and the maze of trenches about Le Petit Priel and Le Catalet copse made the going hard, but between 300 and 400 prisoners have already been taken.

FRENCH TAKE BRENAV.

PARIS, Sept. 21.—French troops captured Benay, five miles south of St. Quentin, last night and repulsed counter attacks at Castres, two and a half miles south of St. Quentin, the war office has announced.

LETTISH TROOPS REFUSE TO FIGHT

Later word was sent her that he was in a hospital in France.

LABOR COUNCIL PERFECTS PLANS

COMMITTEE IS APPOINTED AT MEETING HELD LAST NIGHT TO WORK WITH OTHERS FOR BOND ELECTION.

The Central Labor council, representing the labor interests of the city, will work hand in hand with the Commercial club and the city council in securing the support of the union men in the city in voting the proposed bond issue at the special election held next Wednesday. At a meeting of the Labor council held last night a committee of three, composed of R. R. Canterbury, G. H. Baker and Matt McGee, was appointed to act for the unions in putting the bond issue over and to carry on the work which is to come later in the purchase of the equipment and the organization of the department.

It has been stated that the unions are to carry on their campaign, commencing today, in real earnest and when they have completed their task every man affiliated with the unions in the city will know exactly for what purpose the bond issue is to be voted and for what the money is to be expended and under whose direction the payments are to be made.

NEW EAST LAKE ROAD PROPOSED

WOULD GO IN FROM THE EAST IN THE VICINITY OF CHINA HAT BUTTE—GRADES NOT TO EXCEED 6 PER CENT.

A new road into East Lake from the east, connecting with the China Hat road, is the proposal of the forest service, N. G. Jacobsen, forest supervisor, and W. C. Sproat, engineer, leaving yesterday to take a crew of men and go over the proposed route, to fix permanent grades and locations. The present road into this territory, which leads in from the west up Paulina creek, is in poor condition at the present time, and has been barely passable at any season of the year. Besides this, there are several heavy grades to be encountered.

Over the line of the proposed new road the heaviest grade to be encountered will not exceed 6 per cent., while the majority will mean less than 4 per cent., and will lead through a country ideal for keeping it in the best possible condition for traffic during all times of the year when the lake is accessible.

It is expected that the crew will be on the work the better part of two weeks.

BRITISH MONITOR REPORTED SUNK

LONDON, Sept. 21.—A British monitor was sunk in a certain harbor Monday as a result of an internal explosion. Fifty-seven are missing, the admiralty has announced.

German Spirit is Broken Declares Senator Lewis, on Return From Europe

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin) AN ATLANTIC PORT, Sept. 21.—America has turned the tide of war. Germany's war spirit is broken and the people of the kaiser are filled with wonder and terror, Senator James Hamilton Lewis of Illinois declared upon his arrival here from France. The American fresh troops, he asserted, have humiliated Germany's army, while the submarine warfare has been a complete failure in everything it has attempted.

SHEEPMEN ASK FOR EXTENSION

Sheepmen of Oregon are asking the forest service for further time on the grazing permits on the national forest. The petition is being made through the National Wool Growers' association, and applies to this district as well as other sections of the country. The sheepmen give as their reason for the request the shortage of cars making it impossible for them to ship their feeders at this time.

Members of the forest service this morning stated that the request would undoubtedly be granted. Grazing conditions on the Deschutes national forest are in better shape than in several years, and although the grazing season closes October 15, there will be ample feed to run the flocks much longer than this time.

MASS MEETING TO BE HELD MONDAY

The second of a series of mass meetings to acquaint the people of Bend of the necessity of ample fire protection for the city will be held at the Gymnasium next Monday evening, it was announced today. A free dance will follow the meeting. Pamphlets describing the necessity of fire protective needs are being prepared and will be sent out the early part of the week. One of these is to be sent to each taxpayer in the city.

MERCHANTS' MEETING HAS BEEN POSTPONED

The call for the merchants of the city to meet at the office of A. J. Moore, scheduled to take place Monday evening, has been changed to Wednesday evening, it was announced today by members of the committee. The change was made on account of the mass meeting for fire protection, which is to be held Monday night at the Gymnasium.

BOCHE METHODS ARE PORTRAYED BOND BUYERS COMING FAST

SGT. WHITE TELLS OF HUN WAR. ALL WISH TO DO THEIR PART.

Nothing Too Mean for Them to Attempt, He Declared in Speech Last Night—Carried Bayonet Wound in Thigh.

Hun methods and Hun barbarism were exposed in all their fiendishness by Sergeant White, late of the Canadian expeditionary forces, before a crowd of between 500 and 700 persons at the Gymnasium last night. Sergeant White, one of the members of the Yellow Demon party, spent three years in the service, two of which were on the fighting line in the trenches on the British front. He is given with the power to tell his story in simple but forcible language, and before he had completed his talk many were more thoroughly convinced that Germany must be crushed.

The speaker dwelt at great length on the method used by the Hun armies in their endeavor to exterminate the enemy, stating that nothing was too low, nothing too awful for them to attempt. He held his audience spellbound while he recited the story of his first raid, when he, together with 11 companions, sought to gain information from the enemy trenches. White was the only man who survived the trip, and when he returned to his own lines he was suffering from an eight-inch wound in his thigh inflicted by an enemy bayonet. The man who gave him that wound was the first he had ever killed, the sergeant added, but he had no regrets.

Another speaker of the evening was Judge Stevenson of Portland, who gave many reasons why the people of Oregon should stand behind the administration in the Liberty loan drives. Coupled with his appeal in this direction, he spoke at considerable length on what the government had accomplished and what was yet left to be done.

Previous to the addresses at the Gymnasium meetings had been held at the camps and plants of The Shevlin-Hixon and Brooks-Scanlon Lumber companies, which were well attended. Members of the party left early this morning on their southern trip.

TUMALO FIRST TO SEND PITS

OVER FIFTY POUNDS TURNED INTO THOMPSON'S OFFICE TO BE USED BY GOVERNMENT IN MANUFACTURE OF CARBON.

The Tumalo schools are the first in the county to make contribution of peach and prune seeds to the office of J. Alton Thompson, county superintendent of schools, under the request issued several weeks ago. About 50 pounds of these pits were delivered yesterday, with a like amount yet to come.

Commencing early next week, the school children of Bend will be solicited in making the collection in this city. Boys will be sent to each house in the city to collect the supply, and it is expected that nearly half a ton of these pits will be gathered in this county. They are later to be shipped to Portland, from which place they will be shipped to points designated by the government.

The pits are to be used for the purpose of making carbon for gas masks, the product being especially adapted for this use.

ALLIED DRIVE IS ON IN THE EAST

The report said that "our infantry has passed the line of Krnava, Stragovo, Dragojel and Polochko. Our cavalry is operating north of these places."
