

HUN WARSHIPS ARE GIVEN UP

MET BY ALLIED GRAND
FLEET.

Surrender of All Warships Under
Terms of the Armistice Com-
pleted This Morning—
400 Vessels Receive.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.)
GERMAN FLEET SURRENDERS.
LONDON, Nov. 21.—The German
fleet has surrendered to the grand
fleet, the admiralty has announced.
An American battle squadron, to-
gether with French cruisers and de-
stroyers participated in the cere-
mony.

Four hundred allied vessels, the
biggest fleet to ever be assembled in
the history of the world, are re-
ported to have met the Germans. Among
the vessels in the receiving fleet were
five American dreadnaughts.

The surrender is understood to
have occurred 60 miles off May Isle,
and just off the entrance of Firth
of Forth. The total number of Teu-
tonic ships surrendering is not yet
made known.

The admiralty announcement said:
"The commander-in-chief of the
grand fleet reported this morning at
9:30 that he had met the first and
main installment of the German
high seas fleet, which is surrender-
ing for internment."

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 21.—All
German warships which are to be
surrendered to the allies have cleared
their ports since Monday and are
now on their way to the points desig-
nated for the surrender to occur. As
a result of this move on the part of
Germany to comply with the armis-
tice terms, it is not believed by the
German leaders that the allies will
occupy Heligoland.

WILL ASK MURPHY FOR RESIGNATION

Authoritative Reports from State

JUDGE GRIFFIN IS FOR MOONEY

ASKS THE GOVERNOR
TO GRANT PARDON.

Man Convicted in San Francisco Pre-
paredness Parade May Yet Re-
ceive New Trial if
Stephens Relents.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—
Judge Griffin, before whom Mooney
was convicted, has written to Gov-
ernor Stephens of California asking
that a conditional pardon be granted
the condemned man.

If such a pardon is granted by the
governor it will insure a new trial
for the man who was convicted of
murder in connection with the pre-
paredness day parade bombing in
July, 1916.

Judge Griffin has refused to make
any comment on the letter, except
to admit that it was written Tues-
day.

President Wilson has before inter-
ceded in behalf of Mooney, and labor
leaders have declared that a strike
will result which will stop every
wheel of industry in the nation if
Mooney is executed. Labor has made
no demand that Mooney's neck be
saved if he is guilty of the crime for
which he was convicted, but demands
that a new trial be granted him. It
being claimed that the first trial was
unfair, in that Mooney did not re-
ceive proper representation, and that
witnesses for the prosecution have
been found guilty of perjury.

ITALY WILL REBUILD HER MERCHANT FLEET

ROME, Nov. 21.—Italy is making
it a point of national pride and honor
that she will rebuild her mercantile
marine fleet entirely in her own
yards and with her own resources.
A program to this effect is now
meeting with the most remarkable
nation-wide support since cessation
of hostilities.

To date there has been invested
over 1,000,000,000 francs in install-
ing 88 new shipbuilding yards, and
the number before the end of the
year will be increased to over 100.
Italy estimates she will need 4-
000,000 tons of shipping with which
to replace her boats lost during the
war and bring her entire merchant
fleet up to the capacity necessary to
handle the business that it is now
certain will come.

CZECHS FIGHT WITH THE HUNS

REFUSE TO SURRENDER THEIR
ARMS—TRACKS ARE TORN UP,
PREVENTING FURTHER MOVE-
MENT OF TROOPS.

ZURICH, Nov. 21.—Field Marshal
von Mackensen's troops gave battle
to Czech soldiers Sunday, according
to the Peter Journal. The Czechs
insisted upon disarming the Ger-
mans, who were retreating toward
Pressburg. When the Huns re-
fused to surrender their arms the
Czechs tore up the railway, prevent-
ing further movement of the German
troops. It was then the conflict be-
tween the two forces occurred.

CLUB PLANS FOR POST-WAR WORK

DIRECTORS HOLD SES-
SION YESTERDAY.

Development of New Irrigation Proj-
ects, Woolen and Strach Mills
and Other Industries
Planned.

Tentative plans for the promotion
of the agricultural and the commer-
cial interests of Deschutes county
and the city of Bend in the recon-
struction period expected to follow
the end of the war will be prepared
and laid before the Commercial club
for discussion at an early meeting.
President Foley of the club will
shortly appoint the committee with
instructions to study the situation
and the report will be made, it is
expected, at the first meeting held
after the influenza epidemic ban is
lifted.

Just what should be undertaken
in an after-the-war development pro-
gram was discussed at an informal
meeting of the club directors and
local business men at a meeting held
yesterday, the proposed appointment
of a committee to deal with the
matter following from the discussion.
Among the possibilities mentioned
were obtaining the assistance of the
reclamation service in the develop-
ment of new irrigation projects, pro-
motion of a woolen mill and a starch
factory, the Strahorn railroads, a
new fish hatchery, tourist travel de-
velopment and encouragement to
immigration and land settlement.

Of all these the last was generally
agreed to be the most important and
containing the biggest possibilities.
It was also agreed that to get the
best results it would be necessary to
employ an able representative and
to do extensive advertising. It is
expected that all these matters will
be touched on in the committee re-
port, which will form a basis of dis-
cussion for the club in deciding on
the activity to be undertaken.

POLES FIGHTING WITH UKRAINIANS

Heavy Encounters Are Engaged in
Between Opposing Forces for
Possession of Cities.

VIENNA, Nov. 21.—Bitter fight-
ing is reported to be progressing be-
tween the Ukrainians and the Poles
throughout Southern Russia. The
principal battle has been for the
possession of Lemberg, now held by
the Ukrainians. Fighting is also
progressing at Kotomowa, Przemyśl
and Stanislau.

ALLIED FORCES WHIP BOLSHEVIKI

ing in the Dvina river region be-
tween the Bolsheviks and allied
forces is reported to have taken
place Monday and Tuesday. It is
declared the Bolshevik forces were
defeated with great casualties.

ALLIED ADVANCE STILL CONTINUES

YANKS NOW ON SOIL OF
FOUR NATIONS.

Within Few Miles of City of Luxem-
burg, Which Celebrates Their
Coming—French and
British Advance.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES.
Nov. 21.—The American army of
occupation is now standing on the
soil of four countries. France, Bel-
gium, Luxembourg and German Lor-
raine are seeing the advance of the
Yank troops, who yesterday occupied
a score of villages. The American
outposts are within a few miles of
the city of Luxembourg, whose streets
are gaily decorated awaiting their
entrance before the celebration com-
mences.

BELGIANS REOCCUPY LAND.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Belgians
are rapidly executing the reoccupa-
tion of their country, from which
they have been cut off for more than
four years, and their armies have
made an advance of more than 50
miles since the armistice was signed.

The Americans and the British
have advanced 30 miles, and the
French 50 miles into German terri-
tory.

WORKERS KILLED IN HUN FACTORY

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 21.—Two
hundred persons were killed by an
explosion in a factory in Cologne, fol-
lowing the failure of the revolution-
ists to get the employees to strike.

KILL MOVE TO PROBE ELECTION

FEWER CASES ARE REPORTED

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC
ON THE DECLINE.

No New Patients Have Been Admitted
to the Emergency During the
Past Two Days—May
Lift Lid Next Week.

Conditions at the Emergency hos-
pital yesterday and today have been
better than at any time since the
opening of the institution, it was an-
nounced by those in charge this
afternoon. No new cases have been
admitted during the two days, while
all patients there are showing rapid
signs of improvement, with but one
or two exceptions.

In the city the condition is much
the same. The disease has apparent-
ly passed the crest and is now rapidly
on the decline. While there are still
many people ill with the epidemic
in private homes, the reports to the
health officials are more encouraging
than for several days.

Clyde McKay, acting mayor, and
chairman of the health committee in
the city, yesterday afternoon stated
that if the disease continued to abate
as rapidly as during the past three
days the closing order would be re-
voked some time next week, al-
though no definite date has as yet
been set.

SOLONS NOW KEEPING MUM

MAKE NO REMARKS RE-
GARDING FUTURE.

No Indication of Big Problems with
Which the Next Legislature
Will Have to Wrestle.

SALEM, Nov. 21.—Legislators-
elect apparently have formed an
Oyster club. Never before has a
similar set of men been so mum so
soon before a session as the bunch
of solons that will grace the north
and south wings of the capitol dur-
ing the 40 days of wrestling coming
up early next year.

There seems to be not even an
indication as to the big problems
that will have to be wrestled with.
There is the financial problem, of
course, but that is like the poor
and ever with us. It will be more
marked than usual this year be-
cause of the limitations hedging the
legislators round about, but other-
wise it will be much the same old
story.

Apparently the military police is
in for a good drubbing. The gov-
ernor desires to have the present
organization replaced by a state con-
stabulary of something like 25 men.
He is placed under the mandate of
the state constitution to "see that
the laws are faithfully executed,"
but has nothing to execute them with
excepting the regular peace officers,
who are elected by the people and are
in no manner responsible to the
chief executive for their salaries or
for their jobs. It has frequently
occurred that the governor has been
powerless to execute when the exe-
cuting should be good, and conse-
quently he wishes to have a little
band of men that are responsible to
him alone.

As kindly as the coming legisla-
ture will feel toward the governor, it
is likely that his constabulary scheme
will have about as much show as
the former kaiser would among a
group of Belgian soldiers. "There
ain't going to be no military police"
seems to be the attitude of the noble
few who have been sounded on the
subject and probably this attitude is
pretty general. The governor tried
two years ago to steer the legislature
along his own path for a state con-
stabulary, but it never reached the
goal.

Poor old Clackamas county has
been having a tough time trying to
get by with some sort of a state of-
ficial lately, and has stubbed its toe.
It tried to put Tom Ryan over for
state treasurer and failed and tried
to put Jim Campbell over for the
supreme bench and that jurist is still
trying to figure out how so many
liars could be born and grow up in
a state with a population so limited
as that of Oregon.

WANT NEWS OF OUR PRISONERS

WAR DEPARTMENT CABLES TO
PERSHING TO HAVE NAMES
AND CONDITION OF RETURNED
AMERICANS SENT SOON.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The
war department has cabled to Gen-
eral Pershing that the names of
Americans and their physical condi-
tion who are being returned from the
German prison camps be reported at
once.

The war department is feeling con-
siderable apprehension over the con-
dition of Americans who have been
taken prisoners by the Huns. British
prisoners who have been returned
are in a sorry plight, many of them
having been released without food
and in an impaired physical condi-
tion. It is feared that similar treat-
ment will be accorded the Yanks who
have been so unfortunate as to fall
into the hands of the enemy.

It is understood the return of
American prisoners to their own
lines has already commenced.
