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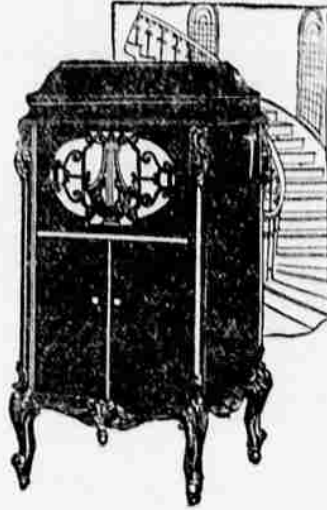

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

Notice of election of Central Oregon Irrigation District to elect one director at large for the term of three years to succeed Director J. G. McGuffie, and to determine whether or not district bonds should be issued in the sum and amount of \$240,000.00.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held by the electors of Central Oregon Irrigation District on the 14th day of January, 1919, to elect a director at large for the term of three years to succeed J. G. McGuffie, and for the additional purpose of determining whether or not six per cent. negotiable coupon bonds of said district shall be issued in the amount of \$222,300.00 in order to comply on the part of the district with that certain contract entered into between it, acting by and through its Board of Directors, and the Central Oregon Irrigation Company on the 13th day of December, 1918, and to secure to the district the properties, rights, benefits and advantages under said contract to accrue to it, and whether or not six per cent negotiable coupon bonds of the district in the additional amount of \$17,700.00 shall be issued to provide a sum sufficient to pay the first year's interest to accrue on said bonds, and to pay the cost and expense of said bond issue as well, making a total bond issue of \$240,000.00 for the purpose of said election said district should be divided into election precincts, described as follows:

PRECINCT No. 1. Beginning at the intersection of the stream commonly known as Crooked river, with the northern boundary of Township 14, South, Range 13 East, of Willamette Meridian, thence westerly to the northeast corner of said Township 14, South, Range 13 East; thence southerly to the southeast corner of said Township 14, South, Range 13 East; thence easterly to the southeast corner of Section 31, of Township 14, South, Range 14 East, W. M.; thence northerly to the intersection of the easterly boundary of Section 18 of said Township 14, South, Range 14 East, with Crooked river; thence westerly and northwesterly along said Crooked river to the point of beginning.

PRECINCT No. 2. Beginning at the intersection of the southerly boundary of Township 15, South, Range 12 East, Willamette Meridian, with the stream commonly known as the Deschutes river; thence easterly to the southeast corner of said Township 15, South, Range 13 East; thence northerly to the northeast corner of said Township 15, South, Range 13 East; thence westerly to the intersection of the northerly boundary of Township 15, South, Range 12 East, with the Deschutes river; thence southerly along said Deschutes river to the point of beginning.

PRECINCT No. 3. Beginning at the intersection of the southerly boundary of Section 7, of Township 17, South, Range 12 East, Willamette Meridian, with the stream commonly known as the Deschutes river; thence easterly to the southeast corner of Section 12 of Township 17, South, Range 13 East; thence northerly to the northeast corner of Township 16, South, Range 13 East; thence westerly to the intersection of the northerly boundary of Township 16, South, Range 12 East, with the Deschutes river; thence southerly and southwestwesterly along the said Deschutes river to the point of beginning.

PRECINCT No. 4. Beginning at the intersection of the southerly boundary of Section 13, Township 18, South, Range 11 East, Willamette Meridian, with the stream commonly known as the Deschutes river; thence easterly to the southeast corner of Section 13 of Township 18, South, Range 11 East; thence northerly to the northeast corner of Section 13 of Township 17, South, Range 13 East; thence westerly to the intersection of the northerly boundary of Section 18 of Township 17, South, Range 12 East, with the Deschutes river; thence southerly along said Deschutes river to the point of beginning.

PRECINCT No. 5. Beginning at the southwest corner of Section 18 of Township 18, South, Range 14 East, Willamette Meridian, thence

easterly to the southeast corner of Section 13 of said Township 18, South, Range 14 East; thence northerly to the northeast corner of Township 17, South, Range 14 East; thence westerly to the northwest corner of said Township 17, South, Range 14 East; thence southerly to the point of beginning.

PRECINCT No. 6. Beginning at the northwest corner of Township 15, South, Range 14 East, Willamette Meridian, thence southerly to the southwest corner of said Township 15, South, Range 14 East; thence easterly to the southeast corner of said Township 16, South, Range 14 East; thence northerly to the northeast corner of said Township 16, South, Range 14 East; thence westerly to the southeast corner of Township 15, South, Range 14 East; thence northerly to the east one-quarter corner of Section 25 of said Township 15, South, Range 14 East; thence easterly to the east one-quarter corner of Section 29 of Township 15, South, Range 15 East; thence northerly to the northeast corner of Section 5 of said Township 15, South, Range 15 East; thence westerly to the point of beginning.

The polling places for said election shall be as follows:

- Precinct No. 1. W. R. Davidson farm house.
- Precinct No. 2. T. S. Stevens' farm house.
- Precinct No. 3. Deschutes school house.
- Precinct No. 4. Grange hall.
- Precinct No. 5. Altalfa school house.
- Precinct No. 6. Community hall.

The polls will be open at 8 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of election and will be closed at 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said day.
