BEND HIGH ENTERS SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

New Relation to Educational System
of Country of Great Benefit
to Students Here.

Through the efforts of Superintendent Moore of the city schools, the Bend high school has been made a member of the Northwest Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. This association operates over the inland empire and contiguous territory. Also, the association co-operates with three other central organizations, the first, the North Central, operating between Canada and the Mason and Dixon line; the second, the Southern, operating below the Mason and Dixon line, and the third, the New England, operating over the New England states.

By virtue of this affiliation the Bend high school has reached the highest accreditation attainable, and any graduate of the local high school will be admitted to practically any college or university in the United States without examination. The exceptions will be those schools only that are not affiliated with at least one of the above mentioned organizations.

The Northwest association was organized last year at Spokane. Superintendent Moore attended the meeting and assisted in the organization. The school he represented at that time became a charter member.

These newspaper quotations represent live cattle prices in Chicago on December 30th, 1918.

The list shows price ranges on nine general classified groups with a spread of \$13.85 per cwt.—the lowest at \$6.50 and the highest at \$20.35.

Why this variation in price?
