Franklin made a bequest of \$25,000 known as the "Dr. Franklin Fund for Loans to Young Married Artificers."

The terms laid down by Franklin were characteristic. They were dictated by sound business judgment. He decreed that the loans should not be more than 50 pounds sterling, nor less than 15 pounds. Borrowers were required to pay each year interest at 5 per cent., together with 10 per cent. of the principal until the loan was paid off. It was with the expectation that the entire fund would be kept busy that Franklin made his estimates of what the total would be in 192 years.
