FOOD ADMINISTRATOR IS CLOSING OFFICE

All Laws Affecting Food Profiteering, However, Will Remain Strictly in Force.

PORTLAND, Jan. 30.—The Oregon branch of the United States food administration, which has been in operation since August, 1917, will be closed this afternoon for it has not enough business to do to warrant the continued expense.

However, all laws effecting food profiteering will be rigidly enforced according to W. K. Newell, federal food administrator for Oregon, until the formal declaration of peace, when the administration loses its present power.

The office furniture will be sold to the highest bidder at a public sale next Tuesday morning. The Oregon food administration workers numbered 24, exclusive of volunteers, at the height of its existence, occupying 10 offices.

One of the most conspicuous accomplishments of the Oregon branch was the wheatless campaign of last June, when the state adopted, voluntarily, a wheatless program for 30 days, saving 18,000 barrels of wheat flour.

GARMENTS NEEDED BY THE RED CROSS

All Articles Should Be Brought in at Once to Bend Chapter Headquarters, Is Request.

A request from Red Cross headquarters that all work now in the hands of local chapters be finished at once has been received by the Bend chapter, and an effort will be made here to comply with it at once. Garments are needed in large quantities for destitute countries, according to the letter.

In view of the need set forth, it is desired that all who are engaged in Red Cross work make an extra effort to finish the work now in hand. All who have knitting are also asked to bring it in at once.

The letter from headquarters is as follows:

"We have a telegram from headquarters at Washington, stating that Mr. Gibson, Red Cross commissioner for France, cables as follows:

"We need large quantities of garments sent monthly for destitute countries. This means continued production of refugee garments, including certain knitted goods, on the largest possible scale. Detailed instructions will be sent out shortly and in the meantime all work now in the hand of chapters should be pushed to completion."

"With this information from headquarters, we would request that all supervisors complete the work on the chapter production orders already sent out as quickly as possible under the present adverse conditions, and that they impress upon the women who have so willingly helped in the past the necessity of keeping up the good work for some time, at least, until the needy civilians in European countries which have been devastated by the war are well supplied with the necessary articles of wearing apparel."

"Instructions have not been sent as to what knitted articles will be required, but the telegram indicates that there is no necessity of disposing of the small amount of yarn left on hand immediately, as it will probably be put to good use as soon as orders come through from Washington."

PARADISE FOR THE POETS

World Surely Would Be Pleasant Dwelling Place If All Sweet Singers Were Endowed.

A contemporary suggests that poets and poetry—be endowed.

Should such a great and holy reform be established the stream of poetry will at last be undammed. The singer will break his chains. The world may finally shake its burning thirst in limpid pools of truth. The lyre will be heard in every town and hamlet. Men will read poetry at meals, then improvise it in their sleep. Newspapers and magazines will teem with it. There will be swarms of poets, like mosquitoes, catching inspiration from every twig and leaf—and fat government subsidies.

Nor is this all. The poet will become a sort of public utility, like the fire department. His job will be to kindle fire, not extinguish it. He will be rushed to the scene of action in a municipal auto, there fittingly to commemorate great deeds. A poet will be available by night or day for all occasions—public as well as private.

But how shall a poet qualify? How become officially endowed? By length of servitude or quantity and quality of product? What the remuneration? Shall we form a poet's zoo, each with his own cage and a yard and trough? Ah, here we become lost in a maze of difficulties. Who will administer the fund? Think how Parnassus might be corrupted!

Yet 'tis worth the experiment. Gayety will be all the world's portion when the poet, jealous of his monetary grant, is found training his muse to jump and bark at pleasure of politics.—Toledo Blade.

Canton a City of Canals.

At Canton, the oldest city in southern China, the river is, in effect, canalized, and the shipping is heavy and varied. The water is deep enough for ships of 3,000 tons burden as far as the city, but foreign boats come up only as far as Whampoa, nine miles to the southeast, where there are extensive docks. Here the loading and unloading is done by native boats. Vessels of deep draft lie outside the bar. Forty miles below is the Boca Tigris (Mouth of the Tiger), and the water widens into a wide estuary. Water divides the old from the new town and surrounds the island and the suburbs, where the Europeans live, so that Canton has an abundance of picturesque water life, including a big houseboat population.

In an outdoor play, with the big timber country for a canvas and with the lives of the lumberjacks for atmosphere, Wallace Reid, the ever popular Paramount star, is ideally cast. But far more than the disturbances of children was the noise the last speaker had to endure. Grown people were rehearsing a play behind the scenes on one side of the stage and athletics in progress on the other, it has been explained.

What opinion of Bend can a stranger carry away when he is harassed in this way after being urged to come to Bend to speak?

Would it not be possible for the club to give someone authority to lock disturbers out of the vicinity of the stage and hall? And is it unreasonable to ask parents to control their children at public gatherings? It is contrary to human nature to expect children seated in groups to refrain from play, and if they are not interested enough to sit quietly with their parents they should not be present.
