## AT THE MOVIES

In "The Trail to Yesterday," the Metro all-star series picture, starring Bert Lytell, which will be shown at the Grand theatre Saturday, the hero buys the cattle "outfit" of a Mexican blackguard, Texas Blanca, John Duncan, the owner of the Double R ranch, is the abettor of the Mexican scoundrel in all of his crooked schemes. He and Blanca plan to outwit the hero, "Dakota," and in order to fool him, Duncan loans the Mexican some of his cattle to enlarge his herd. Blanca rebrands Duncan's steers with his own mark, and arranges with Duncan to call and claim his cattle. Thus "Dakota" is made a common rustler, but vindication comes in a most unexpected way.

A rescue from treacherous quicksands is one of the exciting feats performed by Bert Lytell in his initial Metro all-star series picture, "The Trail to Yesterday." This picture of Charles Alden Seltzer's novel of the rugged west is replete with thrilling situations. For the success of this rescue scene, the cooperation of Anna Q. Nilsson, Mr. Lytell's leading lady, was necessary. Fortunately, Miss Nilsson insisted on carrying out each detail of the hazardous proceeding, declaring that a sense of fear was left out of her make-up. Few war books are so graphic and thrilling as "Private Peat, His Own Story," by Harold R. Peat, a young Canadian soldier who went to France with the first Canadian contingent in August, 1914. Young Peat was in the first German gas attack at Ypres. He gives us one of the most extraordinary accounts of that event, and of the bravery of officers and men, that has yet been written.

Months later, and again at Ypres, he got his own knock-out blow. A German bullet crashed through his lung and put his right arm out of commission for good and all. Two nights and a day he lay in the open until the stretcher bearers found him.
