

EARLY STRIKE SETTLEMENT NOW POSSIBILITY; TIE-UP IN SEATTLE IS WEAKENING

CITY ELECTRICIANS ON JOBS AGAIN.

BUSINESS IS RESUMED

Mayor Hanson Says Strike Broken—Declares Bolshevists and I. W. W. Who Have Gained Control of Unions Should Be Ousted.

SEATTLE, Feb. 8.—Information was given out this afternoon that the strike would be formally called off within 48 hours.

SEATTLE, Feb. 8.—The settlement of the general strike here by agreement now seems possible.

The termination of the general strike would not affect the strike of 39,999 shipyard workers.

Mayor Hanson later asserted that "there is no intention of declaring martial law."

Business Houses Reopen. Restoration of business progressed slowly this afternoon with no reported interference.

Mayor Hansen issued a statement this afternoon declaring that the Bolsheviki and I. W. W. control many of the Seattle labor organizations.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.) OAKLAND, Cal., Feb. 8.—A complete tie-up of all local shippers is imminent.

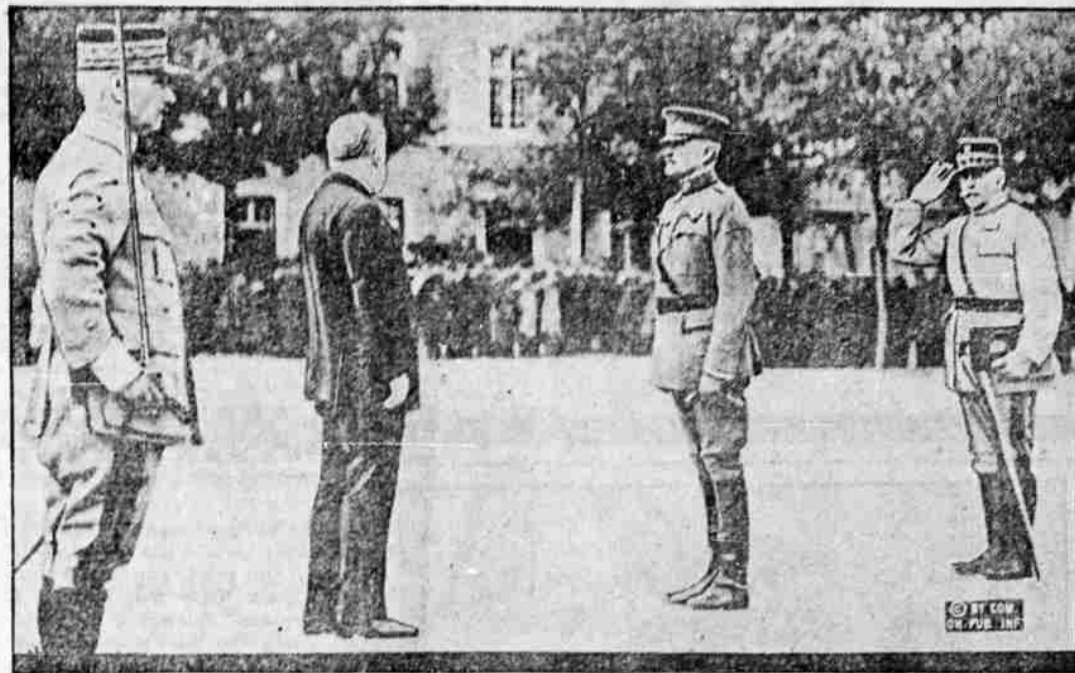
SHIPYARDS STRIKES REACH CONTINENT

LIQUOR TO BE SHIPPED AWAY

ROBERTS WILL DISPOSE OF GROWING STOCK.

Large Quantities of Confiscated Contraband Held by Deschutes County Sheriff to Be Turned Over to Government Officials.

Large quantities of liquor, confiscated in Bend and Deschutes county by Sheriff S. E. Roberts and Chief of Police L. A. W. Nixon, will be turned over to the government authorities within the near future to make up part of a carload of intercepted contraband goods which is to be sent out of the state.

The announcement was made this morning by Sheriff Roberts after conferring with federal agents as to the proper distribution of the increasing stock of whiskey held by the county.

In addition to the liquor now being held here, a considerable quantity is in the possession of Ira P. Holcomb, sheriff of Jefferson county, according to a letter received this morning by Sheriff Roberts in which the Jefferson county official asked advice as to what he should do with the spoil taken from the bootleggers.

Besides the wet goods which will be sent out of Bend under federal supervision, Sheriff Roberts has destroyed several hundred quarts of liquor under court instructions.

SAYS DIVORCES SHOW WORLD IS IMPROVING

Increased Number of Separations Sure Proof, Jurists Inform Ministers.

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.) LOS ANGELES, Feb. 8.—The world is getting better. The increasing number of divorces is the proof.

That is the opinion of Judge Charles Court of the Los Angeles divorce court.

"The question coming up all the time is, what is the cause of the greatly increased rate of divorce cases," he declared, addressing a meeting of Christian ministers. "It is the result of two things."

"First, the increasing wealth of the people and their education. In years past law and lawsuits were the privilege of the few. The result is we have a great many people now who can afford the advantages of the divorce court who could not in the past."

"Second, many people know of the divorce court by reading about it on the front pages of the daily newspapers, who once knew little of divorces. Don't think the greater number of divorce cases indicates the world is getting worse. I believe it is getting better."

CASUALTIES HEAVY IN GERMAN CITY
