SEATTLE, Feb. 8.—Information SEVEN TO RULE (Le United Press to The Bend Bulletin.) the strike would be formally called off within 48 hours. The statement was made by labor men in close touch with the strike committee.

SEATTLE, Feb. 8 .- The settlement of the general strike here by agreement now seems possible. No official answer from the strike leaders to Mayor Hanson's ultimatum that essential industries would be resumed unless the sympathetic tic-up is relieved has been made, but rumors that some members of the strike committee would favor such action are given credit at the mayor's office.

The termination of the general strike would not affect the strike of 30,000 shippard workers, in whose behalf 49,009 other organized workers in the city left their jobs.

"It is believed that the strike is proken," Mayor Hanson declared to-"In the meantime, however, we are going to inaugurate a system of municipal jitneys. Everybody having an automobile is invited to coperate a jitney car, and business is going to be resumed as usual." Every union man in the city lighting department had returned to his job today.



LIQUOR TO BE SHIPPED AWAY

ROBERTS WILL DISPOSE OF GROWING STOCK.

Large Quantities of Confiscated Contraband Held by Deschutes County Sheriff to Be Turned Over to Government Officials.

Large quantities of liquor, confiscated in Bend and Deschutes county by Sheriff S. E. Roberts and Chief of Police L. A. W. Nixon, will be turned over to the government authorities within the near future to make up part of a carload of intercepted contraband goods which is to be sent out of the state.

The announcement was made this morning by Sheriff Roberts after conferring with federal agents as to the proper distribution of the inereasing stock of whiskey held by the county. It is probable the entire shipment will go to California or some other wet state where it may legally be sold.

In addition to the liquor now being held here, a considerable quantity is in the possession of Ira P. Holcomb, sheriff of Jefferson county, morning by Sheriff Roberts in which the Jefferson county official asked advice as to what he should do with the spoil taken from the bootleggers.
