BERG CHALLENGES GUSTAVO TO BOUT

Would Meet Middleweight Champion of Northwest in March—Local Grappler Ready for Carlson.

In a letter received this morning by The Bulletin from John Berg, well known in wrestling circles in the northwest, Berg, who is now making his headquarters in Spokane, issues a challenge to Ad Gustavo of Bend, northwest middleweight champion. He makes no mention of terms, specifying merely a catch-as-catch-can match, to take place in this city any time after March 15.

For several weeks Gustavo has been endeavoring to get in touch with Berg, and has stated that he would be willing to meet him at any time, so there is little doubt but that a bout between the two can be staged in the near future. In view of the fact that Berg will outweigh Gustavo by some 20 pounds, local fans are of the opinion that the local grappler should be given a handicap of some kind to offset this advantage.

At present, Gustavo is training hard for a bout scheduled to take place tomorrow night at the Hippodrome, with Leb Carlson, 175 pounder from Seattle. The middleweight champion is confident that he will be able to secure the advantage over his opponent in a finish match in spite of the big difference in weight.
