### U. OF O. PROFESSOR TO ADDRESS SCHOOL

James H. Gilbert Due Here Monday—Six-Piece Orchestra Organized by Students.

Professor James H. Gilbert of the department of economics of the University of Oregon will address the students in the high school auditorium next Monday afternoon. All those desiring to hear Prof. Gilbert are welcome.

The Rev. S. C. Laslette of the Baptist church of Portland was a visitor to the high school last Monday morning. In his address to the students he made plain the value of education in the schools of today. Rev. Laslette's speech was a sermon in some respects, in that he told of great enterprises made futile by the absence of the backing of the Christian religion.

A six-piece orchestra has been organized by students of the senior high school. Mr. Sexton, who is leader and instructor, is ill this week with mumps, so practicing has been impossible. ### JOHN ERASMY GUILTY OF KILLING ROBINS

Jury Makes Quick Work of Verdict in Second Trial—Sentence to Be Given Tomorrow.

It took the jury in the case of the State vs. John Erasmy, charged with killing robins, just five minutes to find the defendant guilty at the completion of the hearing in justice court late yesterday afternoon. It was the second trial of the case, the first resulting in a hung jury. Sentence will be passed tomorrow morning.

Witnesses for the state were David Greene, Bennie Stevens and Wallace Brown, pupils from the Reid school, living near the Erasmy home in the south end of town. They testified to having seen the defendant shooting robins, which they believed were

used for food. The defense attempted to fasten the blame on Erasmy's 24-year-old son. Erasmy flatly denied killing the birds, while J. Snow Parminster, Ed Jentry and Ben Dewitt testified as to the defendant's good character.

District Attorney A. W. Moore appeared for the state, W. P. Myers acting as counsel for the defense. The jury was composed of George F. Hoover, Fred Fish, P. A. Erickson, Carl A. Johnson, R. L. DeCourcy and Joseph Innes.
