A NEW LIBRARY.


The matter of securing a public library for Bend which will be a credit to the city is being agitated by the Library club members. It is a need which has been felt for some time, but plans along this line, which were well under way, were sidetracked with many other things at the time war was declared.

For immediate use, funds for this purpose are hardly available, as both county and city use the budget system. This means that whatever amount is asked will have to be placed on the estimate of expenses for the coming year, and that the money needed cannot be had until that time.

The implied threat that the library will no longer continue as an institution unless immediate action is taken is perhaps somewhat hasty. Both city and county administrations are known to be heartily in favor of an up-to-date building well stocked with more and better books. but Bend, needs its present library, inadequate though it may be, and should retain it until a better one can be provided.
