**A NEW LIBRARY.**

The matter of securing a public library for Bend which will be a credit to the city is being agitated by the Library club members. It is a need which has been felt for some time, but plans along this line, which were well under way, were sidetracked with many other things at the time war was declared.

For immediate use, funds for this purpose are hardly available, as both county and city use the budget system. This means that whatever amount is asked will have to be placed on the estimate of expenses for the coming year, and that the money needed cannot be had until that time.

The implied threat that the library will no longer continue as an institution unless immediate action is taken is perhaps somewhat hasty. Both city and county administrations are known to be heartily in favor of an up-to-date building well stocked with more and better books, but Bend, needs its present library, inadequate though it may be, and should retain it until a better one can be provided.

**THE LADIES' AUXILIARY.**

Women of Bend are objecting to the suggestion of the president of the State Federation of Women's clubs, that a ladies' auxiliary to the Bend Commercial club be formed. There is already such an organization in existence, they assert, and as proof of this existence it is pointed out that a meeting was held only

two years ago.

The ladies' auxiliary in the past has been closely associated with Bend's progress, but many in this city were of the opinion that the organization had passed into history by a tact understanding rather than by formal action. The work that the auxiliary has accomplished in former years, however, indicates that with Bend entering into a new era of prosperity, the organization may again attain a prominent position in community affairs.

The enviable record that Oregon has made in preceding loans and the thoroughness of the organization effected at the conference of county chairmen and directors last week are believed to be the stimulus to efficiency when the date for subscriptions to the Victory-Liberty loan is reached. Treasury department officials have offered as an incentive to the state first in completing subscription the large flag that floated over the capitol building at Washington during the history-making period of the war. Oregon should win this flag.

**NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.**

Taxes for the current year will now shortly be due.

In paying taxes look up the description of the property on which you wish to pay taxes. After you have paid the taxes verify the descriptions on the tax receipt with your deed records. The tax records go through many hands while in preparation and mistakes are possible.

April 5 is the last date on which the first half of the 1919 taxes can be paid without interest.

October 5 is the last date on which the second half of the 1919 taxes can be paid without interest.

Interest shall be charged on any tax or half of a tax not paid when due at the rate of one per cent. per month or fraction of a month until paid.

All taxes not paid by the 5th day of October become delinquent and on November 5 a penalty of 5 per cent. is charged and collected in addition to the interest.

The attention of taxpayers is also called to the provisions of the law making it their duty to keep the tax collector of the county informed of their true and correct address.

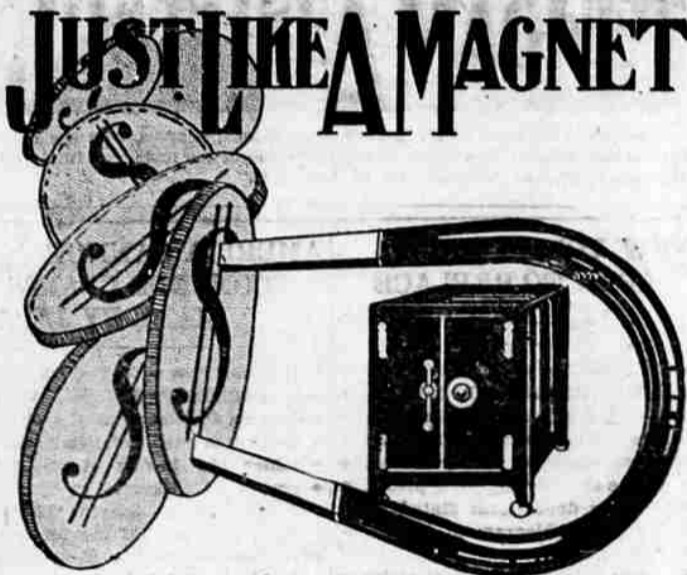
