**LAWRENCE STRIKERS BATTLE WITH POLICE**

Rioters Attack Mill, Then Wreck Windows of Catholic Church—Bullets Inflict No Injuries.

LAWRENCE, Mass., April 7.—Rioting began here early today when more than a thousand striking textile workers rushed the Everett mill, hurling stones through the windows. The Holy Rosary Catholic church was also attacked, and valuable stained glass windows broken.

More than 70 shots were fired by police, who eventually succeeded in quieting the strikers. Twenty-eight of the rioters were placed under arrest. No one was wounded, despite the number of shots.

**HOSPITAL RAIDED BY SINN FEIN MEN**

DUBLIN, April 7.—Thirty men

raided the hospital in Limerick yesterday and rescued a youthful member of the Sinn Fein, who was on a hunger strike. The raiders killed one constable, wounded another and locked four guards in their cells.

Mrs. Ole Simonson Injured When with Batteries Run Down She Attempts to Revive Engine.

She was brought to Bend and the fracture reduced. Mr. Simonson had warned his wife not to drive the car as the batteries were run down and the starting device was in consequence, not in working order.
