CHURCH CONVENTION TO CLOSE TONIGHT

Vote of Thanks Extended to Bend Baptists by Delegates Assembled in City.

After a three days' session the annual convention of the Deschutes Baptist association will come to a close here tonight with an address on "Americanization" by Mrs. A. M. Petty of Portland. Dr. Petty was listed for an address this evening, and Dr. W. B. Hinson, of the East Side Baptist church of Portland, who spoke morning and afternoon, was to appear again tonight. The association reelected W. S. Ayres of Prineville to represent the organization at the annual state convention, and passed a vote of thanks to the Bend Baptist church, which has acted as host during the convention.

NOVEL SOUVENIR IS RECEIVED IN BEND

Three-Inch Shell, British Coins and Pistol and Rifle Cartridges Used to Make Ash Tray.

One of the most novel war souvenirs seen in Bend is in the possession of John Steidl of this city, and represents the work of his son Steve, for two years in the U. S. navy. It

is an ash tray made from the butt of a three-inch shell, with an unexploded rifle cartridge in the center supporting a match box holder made from another piece of the brass shell case.

Bent British pennies soldered on the edge of the cylinder form convenient resting places for cigars, while the outside of the ash tray is covered with British coins and unexploded pistol cartridges, alternating.

DEATH IS RESULT OF "FLU" ATTACK

Father Whose Seven-Year-Old Child Is Taken Now Reported to Be in Critical Condition.

As the result of a sporadic outbreak of influenza in the Brothers section, Eli Wilson, rancher of the high desert, is at the point of death, following the loss of his seven-year-old son from the same disease, it was reported today.

In her new photoplay, "Little Miss Hoover," which will be shown at the Liberty theater tonight and Saturday, Marguerite Clark appears as Nancy, and it is said to be one of her most artistic creations. As stated, the story deals with a Washington society girl who resolves to do her bit toward winning the war by enlisting in the army of the food administration. In the course of her efforts she reunites her grandfather with her grand-uncle, who had fought on opposite sides in the Civil war, changes a fading Maryland estate into a modern win-the-war farm, gets rid of a suitor to whom she has promised herself, annexes a gentleman whom she has grown to love and makes everybody happy.

John S. Robertson directed Miss Clark and they went to Washington for the first scenes, which have the streets of the Capitol City and the White House for their background. The leading man is Eugene O'Brien.
