Mrs. A. L. French is expected to arrive from Lexington, Kentucky, about the end of the week to join her husband here.

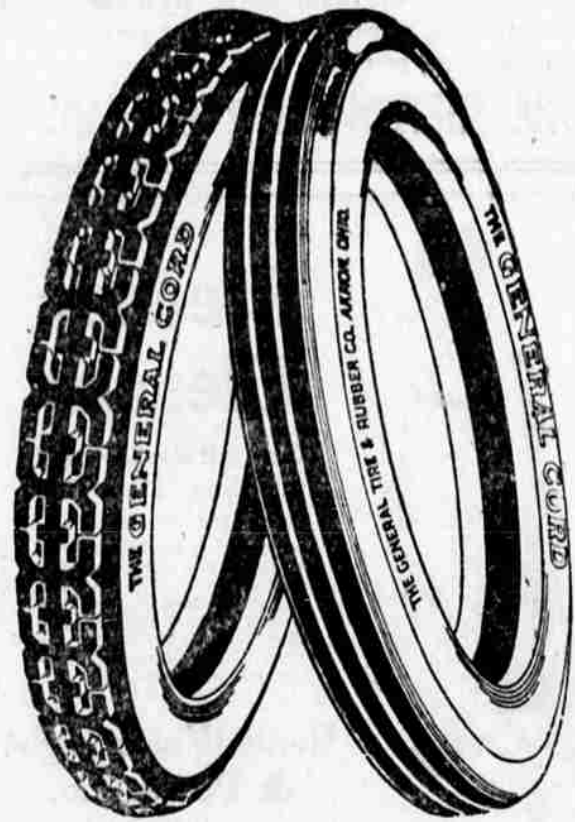
P. R. BROOKS DIVORCED.
