and city would cooperate in rebuilding the bridge across the Deschutes at the foot of Tumalo.

Bids for street sprinkling, left over from a previous meeting, were briefly discussed and the contract for the summer awarded to L. B. Kennedy at \$7.25 per team per day. Fire Ordinances Passed.

That money is now available on street improvement bonds recently contracted for by the Lumbermen's Trust Co. of Portland, was announced. Bids for the work will be advertised for in the near future.

Numerous fire ordinances were read for the second time and passed, and an ordinance providing for the sale of \$1453.72 in 6 per cent. bonds for sewer lateral 43 was adopted under an emergency clause.

An ordinance suggested by the health committee, providing for the screening of toilets and forbidding scattering of animal or vegetable refuse matter, was read for the first time.

The council took action to condemn a number of frame structures on the alley running from Minnesota to Oregon, between Bond and Wall streets. Complaint that cattle are frequenting the city camp grounds, to the annoyance of the campers, were referred to the poundmaster.

this end. German agents are in Russia advocating the mutual advantages of secret cooperation between the two nations.

Once this movement shows signs of progressing, its spread into China and Japan will be deftly sought by Germany's leaders. Germany threatened this very outcome to Ambassador Gerard when America was preparing to enter the war. The ruthless brutality of the Germans during the war savors more of an oriental race than a western nation. The Germans may thus claim racial relationship with the orient for the purpose of urging cooperation.

The situation is certain to develop into a serious menace unless the western diplomats quickly begin to counteract the new German propaganda. Russia is the key. With Russia hostile to Germany's designs, the Germans will be impotent. They will be geographically isolated from the far east and unable to form an effective oriental alliance. The western democracies, therefore, must revise their treatment of Russia, or see Germany continue as a dangerous plotter against civilization's progress.

### IRRIGATION LAW CHANGES NOTED BY STATE ENGINEER

in the limits of a municipality may now be included in an irrigation district. This amendment was deemed necessary on account of the large area of agricultural land which is included within the limits of some of the municipalities within or adjacent to the irrigation districts.

"Provision has also been made for the reclamation of lands in an irrigation district in units. Heretofore it was necessary that every acre of irrigable land in a district should be assessed the same as every other irrigable acre. This brought about a tendency to exclude land from the district, which would increase the cost against the main body of land notwithstanding the fact that it might be entirely feasible to irrigate

those lands at a higher cost. It will now be possible to include lands in an irrigation district as a separate unit, and assess them according to the cost of reclamation.

"Under the irrigation district law as enacted in 1917 the district could not require construction bonds in excess of 25 per cent. of the amount of the contract. This has been cured as the statute provides that no such bonds shall be less than 25 per cent. of the construction cost.

"The drainage district law was also amended in some important features, as that it now corresponds more closely with the irrigation district law and all question has been eliminated as to whether or not the obligation of the district was an individual or community obligation, by fixing it definitely as a community obligation.

viding for the certification of drainage district bonds in the same manner as irrigation district bonds are now certified.

"Summing up therefor, much favorable legislation was secured effecting reclamation. In fact the last legislature seemed to take a more favorable view toward reclamation than its predecessors."
