89,000 TROUT FRY SENT TO HATCHERY

Finy Fish from Eggs Taken at Elk Lake to Be Fed Until Large Enough for Planting

The second carload of eastern brook trout fry to be placed in the Tumalo hatchery this year arrived in Bend this morning, and the contents of 178 cans were emptied into the fish pools to be fed until large enough for distribution. It is esti mated that the fry in the shipment will total 90,000.

The car was sent from the Bonneville hatchery, and is part of the result of a large take of eggs collected at Elk lake last winter and brought to Bend by Pearl Lynes and assistants before the plant on the Tumalo was ready to be used.


