BEND-SISTERS IS NEARLY COMPLETE

Within the next two days the preliminary surveys on the Bend-Sisters road, now being conducted under the direction of G. I. Stebbins, localing engineer for the state highway commission, will be finished. Today the crew, working under Mr. Stebbins, is about two miles from Sisters.

Upon the completion of this survey Mr. Stebbins and crew will probably begin surveys on the Dalles-California highway preparatory to the letting of the contract and actual construction work.

It is expected that the highway commission will let the contract for a part of this road construction at the next meeting, in August.

SHEEPMEN WILL POOL INTERESTS

MANAGER TAKES CARE OF BUSINESS.

Tumalo-Cline Falls Sheep Association Hurdles More Than 1000

Head—Cooperative Ranging Is Successful.

Contrary to the belief held by many range experts that cooperative grazing is not practicable, the Tumalo-Cline Falls Sheep association this year is experiencing unexpected success in ranging more than 1000 head of sheep on the Deschutes national forest.

Because this association has chosen one strain of sheep, all of similar habits of shelter and food, it has been made possible to collect all the sheep of the association under one range manager. It is expected, owing to the successful range year, that the Tumalo-Cline Falls Sheep association will have fully 1000 mutton lambs for the market this year.

At a meeting Wednesday evening the executive committee of the association adopted its rules and regulations, whereby provision is made for the purchase of pure bred bucks during the summer months, the employment of head-herders, any or all of whom must own sheep and be members of the association, the marketing of wool and lambs, cooperative bargaining between the association and the forest service and the management of all business of the association. The president, secretary-treasurer and a member of the executive committee, three sheep owners, comprise the executive committee.

Small Owner Helped.

Through the perfection of this association, the owner of a small band of sheep will have equal advantages on the range with the larger sheep herders and will experience uniformity in management, each sharing pro rata the overhead costs.

This summer 1919 head of sheep are being taken care of under the association. This year provision is being made for the purchase of 30 pure bred Hampshire bucks for about 1000 pure bred Rambouillet ewes. The association will collectively purchase these bucks. It is the intention of the association to send a member to the Salt Lake ram sale, August 26 to 28, inclusive.
