SEEK AID FOR NITRATE WORKS

the other that of scraping the bottom as the lake dries up in the summer, by this means securing a mixture of potassium nitrate, sodium nitrate, sodium bicarbonate, and common salt, which is left almost free from impurities in a layer from a quarter to a half an inch deep as the water recedes in the summer. If the latter system is followed, it is probable that the crude salts would be brought to Bend for refining.

Natural Fertilizer is Found.
Another proposition which is being considered at the lake lies in

the vast deposit of what is believed to be a high grade fertilizer found under the layer of crystallized salts. Countless millions of worms, as they are called for want of a better and more descriptive name, live in the water, dying each year after depositing their eggs, as the water recedes and they are left without the amount of water necessary to sustain life.

It is from these masses of animal life, decaying, that the lake derives its unpleasant but entirely accurate name, and the fact that these same odoriferous deposits are from an inch to six inches deep all over the bottom of the lake has led officers of the company to send out samples in order that the commercial value may be ascertained.

MINER PURCHASES WALL STREET SITE

Property Adjoining American Bakery Secured from Bend Company —Brick Building to Be Put Up.

Mr. Miner stated that it is his intention to begin the erection of a one-story brick building on the property. The structure will be an arcade building and will have offices on the entire floor. As to when this building would be started Mr. Miner said would depend on the availability of labor and materials.
