 Although of great benefit to Central Oregon roads, the rain will have but little effect on crops. The rapage will be aided materially, but dry land agriculturists will gain to no appreciable extent as jackrabbits and drouth have already cut the possible yield almost to a minimum. Much alfalfa in the irrigated districts is already down and was being cured, and this will be delayed to a certain extent while great care will have to be used to prevent mould.  
 In the forests no fires have so far resulted from the lightning which accompanied the rain, but this does not mean that none will result, for the moisture will prevent any from breaking out for several days.
