**A CRISIS.**

Apparently the reclamation service's idea of the investigation of the Benham falls reservoir site is an investigation which does not cost too much. At least, that is the conclusion to be drawn from the statement, made today, that unless arrangements are made at once the work of the geologists now here will be ended with a preliminary report and any real decision as to the reservoir will wait until borings can be made. This may be next year or the year after, or whenever we shall be able to create enough interest in Washington to get the work done.

If we should have to wait now, after all we have been through to get the business to its present point, it would be a great misfortune. It would mean that the investigation now going on would be merely a teaser. Assuming that Congress passes the Mondell bill providing funds for reclamation, none could be allotted to the Deschutes project until final report had been made. What we want, on the contrary, is to have things in such shape that the report will precede the passage of the bill. Then, if it is favorable, we have Secretary Lane's promise to take up the project as soon as the money is available.

Now, if ever, is the time for concerted action on the part of the irrigation and commercial in-

terests of Deschutes and Jefferson counties to get the necessary boring done at once.
