

SCHOOLS OPEN SEPTEMBER 15

BUILDINGS UNDERGO RENOVATION.

New Courses Offered—Text Book Change Effective This Year—Compulsory Attendance Up to 18 Years in Grades.

The Bend Public Schools will open in all departments Monday September 15 at nine o'clock a. m. The date of opening this year has been set one week later than the usual time on account of the construction work under way at the Kenwood school.

The other three buildings in the school plant have undergone a thorough renovation during the summer months and in addition the plumbing system and the heating plants are being repaired and necessary additions made.

In general the plan of organization followed last year will obtain for the coming year. The first six grades will be housed in the Central Kenwood and Reid schools and the seventh to twelfth grades inclusive will attend the high school.

Definite assignments have not been made as yet; but it is probable that the principalship will be designated as follows: Junior senior high school, R. C. Johnson; Central school, Ivy Davidson; Kenwood school, Clara Hudson; Reid school, Vernolea Cane.

Courses in biology will be offered for the first time in the Bend schools this year and it is probable the school nurse will offer courses in first aid and home nursing during the year. An O. A. C. graduate has been secured to head the department of manual training and athletics. He comes highly recommended by the college and has had successful experience in his line of work both in this state and in Washington. Half hour periods will be given in twice each week in the grades, and once each week in the high school.

and Junior high throughout the year. The work will be elective in the high and junior high schools.

On account of the recent state adoption of text books, the purchase of school books has been passed from the board of education to the patrons of the district. Pupils will be expected to provide themselves with books adopted in 1919, through local dealers. Re-adopted texts will be issued to pupils on request as long as the present supply lasts at 20 to 40 per cent on the original cost, depending on the condition of the goods.

The 1919 session laws of Oregon make school attendance compulsory up to 18 years for those who have not completed the eighth grade. The situation in this district will be analyzed and the applications of the law compiled with. Employers will do well to investigate the law as applied to employees between the ages of sixteen and eighteen years who have not completed the equivalent of eight grades in school.

The faculty for the coming year, consisting of 43 teachers, is practically complete. With the exception of principals there will be but two members of last years force remaining at the Central and Reid schools and the force at Kenwood will be made up of new faces and the number doubled. There will be three and two new teachers added for work in the special branches in music and art, and physical training.

Coupling an organization of one years growth with a reasonably satisfactory school plant and unquestionably the best faculty that the present wage scale will attract we feel that the future shows the possibility of substantial forward movement in building a creditable school system.

Definite announcements relative to the assignment of teachers and for districting ward schools will be made at a later date.

EVENTS START WITH PARADE.

Several hundred workers of Central Oregon are expected to be in line of march, headed by local Prof. Mahoney. H. E. Nordeen will be marshal of the day. The line will form at the Hippodrome.

Following the parade Hon. Eugene E. Smith and Denton G. Burdick will address the workers in the auditorium of the Bend Amateur Athletic Club on topics of interest to organized labor. While the parents are being entertained at the gymnasium the kiddies will enjoy Mary Pickford on the screen in "Hulda From Holland," to be shown at the Liberty Theater. This program will last until 2 p. m. and the children up to 16 years will be guests of the management of this movie house.
